

## PERSONALIZED LEARNING

Personalized learning structures schools, classrooms, and instruction so we can better respond to the individual needs of students, instead of expecting students to fit the current mold or adapt to structures that may not be successful for them. Many of our teachers implement elements of personalized learning in their classrooms right now. Key elements include:

- **Integrated Digital Content**  
Digital content that allows for a differentiated path and pace
- **Targeted Instruction**  
Instruction aligned to specific student needs and learning goals
- **Data Driven Decisions**  
Frequent data collection that informs instructional decisions and groupings
- **Student Reflection and Ownership**  
Ongoing student reflection that promotes ownership of learning

The modern concept of personalized learning leverages technology tools, classroom organization, student ownership, and redefines the terms teaching and learning to help educators truly meet the individual needs of students in their classrooms. 
### MEREDITH MCCULLOUGH KENAI CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL, ENGLISH TEACHER

## AIMSWEB

KPBSD students did very well in the Aimsweb Nationally Normed Benchmark assessments. The students in grades one through five showed tremendous growth in both reading and math. In the spring Test of Oral Reading measure, 76% of KPBSD students scored at or above the average range. In the Math Concepts and Applications measure, over 77% of KPBSD students scored at or above the average range in the spring.


