During the 2017-2018 school year, Cooper Landing School students experienced many successes and exciting opportunities. All of the students participated in the annual float and fish trip on the upper Kenai River; everyone caught many fish and a fun time was had by all. All of the students participated in 6 weeks of snowboarding or ski lessons at Alyeska in Girdwood, and students grade K-7 participated in a week of swimming lessons at Seward High School pool.

This year Cooper Landing School received an Excursion Grant from the Rasmussen Foundation. This grant made possible two field trips to Anchorage to see performances at the Alaska Junior Theatre. Students enjoyed Anatomy of the Piano and Step Afrika!

Cooper Landing School was very proud of our 5-6 and high school Battle of the Books teams. The Mighty Lynx 5-6 team, made up of one 5th grader and two 6th graders, took 2nd place in the district battle. The Dynamic Duo high school team, made up of one freshman and one 7th grader, took 1st place in the district battle and went on to place 7th in the state battle.

All students at Cooper Landing School participated in a community service project. Students K-9 helped with the community clean up, cleaning up litter in Helen Rhode Park and under the bridge at the end of Bean Creek Road.

Mr. Gossard secured an Access Grant through the Rasmuson Foundation and the State Council on the Arts. We had Brian Hutton, a theater artist from Anchorage, come to the school for a week and do workshops with all of the students, grade K-9. The students learned miming and improvisational skills. At the end of the week, parents were invited for a luncheon and a performance by the students. The program was a great success.

Cooper Landing School won the small school division and the overall grand prize in the Kenai Aluminum Can Round-Up through ReGroup. The school brought in over 1,400 pounds of aluminum cans and received a prize of \$736.

Several students this year received awards for academic achievements. Our 9th grade student received an award for perfect attendance, she also won the Science Student of the year award from Soldotna Prep and the 4.0 GPA certificate from Mr. Dusek. One Kindergarten student and one 6th grader received certificates for almost perfect attendance, missing only one day of school. And last, but not least, our Kindergarten, 1st, and 2nd grade students won certificates for 1st place in the Lexia Team Challenge.

This year was a challenging year in a few ways, but overall it was a good year with many accomplishments and great opportunities for our students and their familes. Here are some of the highlights of the year.

Stephanie Zuniga and Hannah Snow were both Nominated as BP Teachers of Excellence.

Fireweed Academy worked with Representative Paul Seaton's Office to get a Legislative Citation written for Bunnell Street Arts Center for their Artists in Schools Program. Rep. Seaton and I presented the citation to Asia Freeman and Adele Person at the Bunnell's member potluck on Friday, May 24, 2018.

Fireweed Academy hosted five Artists in Schools residencies, two silk painting projects, two acrylic painting projects and one storytelling project.

This year Fireweed partnered with HoWL (Homer Outdoor Wilderness Leadership) for our 6th grade trip. The five day camping trip across the bay was a great success. HoWL staff provided a variety of activities including wilderness survival skills, paddleboarding, and rock climbing. The third through fifth grade students participated in a three day trip to Kasitsna Bay Laboratory.

There were many school celebrations this year, that were well attended by students and their families: annual beginning of the year BBQ, Ellis Island Simulation, AIS gallery nights, promotion ceremonies, and a end of the year BBQ at Ageya Wilderness Center.

All staff members have participated in the Kagan Cooperative Learning 4/5 day workshops. One staff member is now a certified Kagan Coach. Fireweed Academy hosted a Kagan Win-WIn Discipline two day workshop in August and included the staff of West Homer Elementary. Other professional development oppportunities included a Socratic Seminar workshop provided by Altheneum out of Anchorage. Wise at Work provided a workshop called Neurobiology at Work.

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Parent power was the name of the game at the beginning of the school year, when two new pieces of playground equiptment was installed at Little Fireweed. Aproximatley, 15 parent volunteers and a small work crew from Gregoire Construction got the job done. Another improvement at Little Fireweed was complete a few weeks ago. The three classrooms previously did not have wall that went up to the ceiling, which meant that the building noise level was loud. Walls have been extended to the ceiling and doorways and doors have been installed which provides for a quite learning environment.

The school's Facebook page was revived after a year long hibernation. On average three to five photo albums were posted each week, allowing parents and other family members could see what the student were engage in at school.

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Hope School was reduced by one certified staff member but did hire a instructional aid for support.

Hope School is without doubt, the center of the Hope community. Events and fundraisers at the school are well supported. Parent Teacher conference attendance is 100%. Even though it is a very small school, students have opportunities in Battle of Books, Mind-a-Mazes, Quest, 4H, Spelling Bee, Jump Rope for Heart, Forensics, and Cross Country Skiing. Our junior student won the Mind-a-Mazes district contest again this year. This is the fourth time out of five opportunities he has won this honor. Staff have worked hard to create opportunities for collaboration with three other schools. Tustumena, Hope, Moose Pass, and Cooper Landing share professional development opportunities focused on Personalized Learning. The secretaries of Moose Pass, Cooper Landing, and Hope have created a shared electronic newsletter that connects and informs all of the communities. This newsletter has organically been labeled "The Tri-School Newsletter," and is accessed by up to 100 readers per week. This newsletter is linked to the Tustumena newsletter as well which is accessed by an additional 150 devices per week.

Fundraising is a challenge in such a small school but the spirit of the school staff makes events that are well supported. Flea markets and pie auctions are among the most common in Hope. The 2018-19 school year will start with plenty of students but will be hiring a new secretary as our long-time secretary and community member decided she needed the opportunities that Anchorage could afford her family.

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An outstanding achievement for Moose Pass School was to stay open. It is a common worry in Moose Pass that the school may not make the level of 10 students in order to remain open. The school year began with 12 and ended with 15 students. Next year it is scheduled to open with at least 14 students with one more family trying to decide if their student should stay at Moose Pass or move to Seward as a seventh grader. Moose Pass began the year with a new teacher, Sandra Barron. This transition was made easier by having the former certified teacher, Heather Lindquist, remain on staff as a classified para educator.

Moose Pass School is without doubt, the center of the Moose Pass community. Events and fundraisers at the school are well supported. For example, the Halloween Carnival was very well attended as was the Christmas Play/Performance. It is my observation that the audience attendance is approximately 5:1 (audience members to student ratio)

Parent Teacher conference attendance is 100%. Even though it is a very small school, students have opportunities in Battle of Books, Mind-a-Mazes, Quest, Lego Robotics, Girl Scouts, Spelling Bee, Soccer, Jump Rope for Heart, Forensics, and Cross Country Skiing.

Staff have worked hard to create opportunities for collaboration with three other schools. Tustumena, Hope, Moose Pass, and Cooper Landing share professional development opportunities focused on Personalized Learning. The secretaries of Moose Pass, Cooper Landing, and Hope have created a shared electronic newsletter that connects and informs all of the communities. This newsletter has organically been labeled "The Tri-School Newsletter," and is accessed by up to 100 readers per week. This newsletter is linked to the Tustumena newsletter as well which is accessed by an additional 150 devices per week.

Fundraising is a challenge in such a small school but the spirit of the school staff makes events that are well supported. Holiday markets and pizza sales are just two of the ways the find to support the students. Much of these funds go to sending students on field trips such as skiing and outdoor education sessions.

The 2018-19 school year will start with plenty of students and zero new staff members. It is likely to be a great year.

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2017-18 Highlights from Kenai's Neighborhood School

ENROLLMENT

Mountain View Elementary continued its growth with a major increase in enrollment this year. In addition to our 3rd consecutive year enrolling over 70 kindergarteners, we had 80 new to school (40 new to district) students enroll as well this year. We hired two new teachers after the start of the year and will be receiving our 4th portable classroom this summer. Next year's enrollment, including PRE-K is expected to top 500.

SCHOOL CULTURE

In September , we hosted "Diversity Day", where individuals with disabilities, as well as experts in the field of disabilities, came to Mountain View Elementary to set up eight different stations for presentations on a wide variety of physical and cognitive disabilities. As KPBSD's largest open enrollment school, we provide a number of programs to meet the needs of students with disabilities. All of our students benefit from their daily interactions within this diverse student body. This year's Diversity Day helped broaden a natural development of empathy and further prepare our students to participate in an inclusive society.

Kindness was the focus of a school-wide assembly at the end of 1st quarter. A variety of short skits, songs, and other presentations focused on all aspects of kindness. Teachers and students from across the school teamed up to celebrate the conclusion of our annual, start of the year, eight week focus on Positive Responses to Conflict and Kindness. Having all students, staff and families utilize positive responses to respectfully resolve conflict has long been a staple of our school's Strategic Plan.

Our PTA designed, purchased and distributed tee-shirts to the students at Mountain View Elementary with the saying, "Kindness Counts." The message is clear as to the behavioral interactions we place a priority on here at our school. While respect is often

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the "go to" theme for school-wide expectations, our staff feels that kindness is indeed a step up in this area as it reaches a deeper emotional level.

Before Winter Break, fifty staff members from Mountain View Elementary boarded a school bus and ventured out into the neighborhood to spread a little kindness. Our first stops were for caroling. We surprised staff at Kenai Middle School and Kaleidoscope Elementary School and then went on to do the same at Kenai Post Office. Our final stop, arranged in advance, was the best of all. We enjoyed lunch at the Senior Center. Three out of the eight seats at each table were reserved for our staff which allowed for some great mingling, visiting and discussions. We sang carols with the seniors to top off a great day

ACADEMIC

We received a Carrs/Safeway Inovation in Education Grant, these funds, when combined with other funds we had been saving, allowed Mountian View to purchase 48 Ipads by years end. We currently have a committee to faciliate teacher training and establish use protocol so that these devices are used effectively to advance Personalized Learning with a strong focus on the primary level.

We introduced intermediate as well as primary "code club" after school programs. The students were introduced to writing computer code. They eventually were able to start creating their own individual games to play. Our goal is to get kids using digital devices thay have acces to at home to design and create games instaed of just mindlessly playing them. Both of these clubs ran for a quarter, were completely full and expansion of this program is planned for next year.

Band and choir continue to be popular pursuits for students at Mountian View. Over 75 % of 5th grade students participated in band. Forty students participated in after school choir.

We once again hosted the KPBSD Trimathalon. Over 100 students from schools around the district came to our school for this competition. Kudos to our staff as this required quite bit of flexibility to make this happen.

Students in the class frequently Skyped with engineer David Apperson, a Mechanical Engineer from PDC engineers in Anchorage and Seward High alumni. Mike Insalaco, John Foutz assisted students with their project ideas. Steve Fink- AVTEC's Maritime Simulator Technician- assisted students with programming in Python. Stephanie Presley -Seward/Bear Creek Flood Service Area Coordinator. Matt Widamann-Assisted students with Autodesk AutoCAD. Marion Glaser-wildlife biologist, came into share how she uses math and science regularly on her job. Jake Collins, From Edward Jones, spoke to students about the importance of investing at a young age. Finally, Kyle Walker, from the Seward Journal worked closely with student in journalism with SHS Today. He came in to teach lessons about writing articles. Seward Journal published several student articles this year. Finally, students had a guest from the City instructing them how and where to register to vote.

Finally, 6 students were provided the opportunity to travel to Hydaberg for a 5 day STEAM fest.

George Reising worked alongside Kim Leslie, Amanda Adams, Kristin Davis, and Sean Campbell to develop a framework for secondary teachers in regard to personalized outcomes. They plan to launch a trial version of a personalized outcome-infused course this fall, with the hope of having a viable and sharable "product" to offer all KPBSD secondary teachers for the 2019/2020 school year to give kids an opportunity to have inspiration, time and support within their school day to pursue learning that's of extreme value to them personally.

In sports, Ruby Lindquist was the Outstanding Athlete of the 2018 Alaska State Track and Field Championships. She was also the Region III Athlete of the Year, and the Seward High School Athlete of the Year. She won the Girl's 800, 1600, and 3200 at both the State and Regional Championships.

Soldotna Prep School is a 9th Grade academy that works hand in hand with Soldotna High School. Soldotna Prep has an enrollment of 192 full time students all of whom are in the 9th grade. Soldotna Prep offers appropriate grade level courses in Language Arts, Biology, Pre-Algebra, Algebra, Geometry, and Alaska History. SPS provides a full array of elective courses for 9th graders such as Geography, Sport Specific Training, Lifetime Activities, Health, Band, Choir, Art, Ceramics, Technology, Vocational Education, and Spanish I. SPS also works in conjunction with KPBSD Distance Delivery to offer students access to curriculum not offered in our traditional program or as an option to the classroom setting. Students accessed course work in Algebra, Computer Applications, Employability Skills, Health, Geography, Geometry, and Foreign Language. Soldotna Prep implemented a daily schedule and teaching assignments that contributed to the success demonstrated this year. Teachers are organized into core teams with one history, math, science, and language arts teacher per 100 (approx.) students. The four teachers work as a team and have a common prep time where they meet periodically together to develop and plan core teaching methods as well as design interventions for struggling students.

Staff Accomplishments: Mr. Will Chervenak completed his Administrative internship at Soldotna Prep this year and was awarded a Master's Degree from U.A.A. Credit Acquisition

Compared to previous 5 years of data for Soldotna Area 9th graders Soldotna Prep School experienced an increase in the percentage of students earning 6 or more high school credits, an increase the percentage of students who are on track for graduation, and an increased reduction in the number of students earning 5 or less credits. 75.3% of Soldotna Prep's students will have earned 6 or more credits and Soldotna Prep will have 84.3% of the 9th grade class be on track to graduate in 4 years. This is in comparison to the previous 5-year average of 69% earning 6 or more credits and 75% of Soldotna Area 9th graders being on track to graduate in 4 years. Additionally, 28.6% of our students will have actually earned more than one year's worth of high school credit at the end of their freshman year and the number of students who are far behind pace to graduate in 4 years has been reduced by 14.5 per cent when compared to the 5-year average. The biggest gains in recent years has been in the students who are far behind this number continues to decrease while the numbers of students who are closer to being on track graduate or who are on track to graduate continue to slowly rise.

Here is the final data for the 2017-18 School Year for Soldotna Prep Academic Performance: 178 Total Students

134 (75.3%) --- Passed all classes and earned 6 or more credits for the 2017-18 school year. 150 (84.3%) --- Passed all classes or had only one F and are on pace for 5.5 or more credits for the 2017-18 school year.

Our outstanding achievements are measured best by our releationships. We started the year with a well attended Open House event and began to immediately begin work with the community to plan for the fall carnival coming in October. This event is the first of the year that brings, seemingly, the entire community though the Tustumena doors with an estimated 400 people in attendance. It is good clean fun and a very successful fundraiser for our PTO. This event also culminates a multiple prize auction that also raises funds but additionally creates community partnerships as their donations result in advertizement do the community. Our carnival has a Halloween theme but always falls on the last Friday of October so does not always correlate with October 31. In the case it does not match up, we also partner with the KPL, Boys and Girls Club, and the Eagles to provide a Trunk or Treat event in order to facilitate a safe and convienent event for kids to dress up for Halloween and go trick or treating. Our school also partners with the Kasilof Boys and Girls Club. This partnership has multiple benefits for our community. First, it is a safe place for kids to be after scchool. On average, 25% of our student body attend per day with a total of over 50% of the student body as members. This club is not only a service to our community but to the children themselves. Because of the rate of free or reduced lunches served in our school, the club qualified for a five year grant to serve supper. It is a sad note that so many families qualify for this program but in qualifying, the club serves actual meals to each child each night before they go home, not just a after school snack. We also partner with the Kasilof Public Library. This partnership is nearly 50 years old. It is mutually beneficial partnership that provides all community members with library access and provides the school with a larger selection of books, updated computers and this year, new furniture that we share.

Still another partner is the Kasilof Community Church. Each Tuesday this church provides an afterschool program for approximately 60 students. This church is our "Parent pickup point" for our ALICE plan. Because of our unique setting and unavailability of any structure large enough to accommodate all of our children and staff within walking distance. Our plan includes remote site bus loading and transportation to the KCC facility where parents would be directed to pick up their children if we were to have an intruder-type emergency.

Through our school newsletter, we began "Parent University". This is a series of links imbedded into the newsletter. These links are generated by our teachers in response to the help specific grade level student may need in order to remember how to do their

homework. Parents are often frustrated by not being able to help with homework because the methods and strategies have changed since they were in school. Parent University aids in closing that gap. In tracking the success of this program, I can see a number equal to 25% to 50% of the targeted grade level support households accessed the links.

First quarter Parent/Teacher conferences were well attended but some conferencing had to occur via telephone in order to assure 100% contact.

Tustumena students experienced several district level competition successes. Our Battle of Books team placed 4th in the grade 3/4 category while our 5/6 team missed the finals by one question. The district Forensics match, hosted by Tustumena, featured nine categories with three grade levels in each category. Within these 27 specific competition, Tustumena students had several students place in the top three in nine of them. Additionally Tustumena held spelling bee competions, National Geographic Sponsored Geography Bee as well with winners advance to the state level. Two unique opportunities that Tustumena students experienced this year were Campfire time and Thinkers Club. Campfire time was focused on K-3 grade students who, on a weekly basis during third quarter, particiapted in storytelling, Character Counts lessons, and old fashioned campfire songs. Thinkers Club involved students grades 4-6. Each week students learned strategies in team building, process planning, product based learning. Often there was not a "first place" but rather a criteria of success. Most of the projects were based on the ability to communicate clearly with a team. These teams were set up in a multiple of ways including student selected, teacher selected, and random selection. In each project, student were asked to analyse their success and correlate that success with the teams ability to function together. One of the biggest successes of the Tustumena staff is difficult to appriciate in a numaric fashion. They are all part of a bigger picture. They work together to make this a great place to be. The average number of years of service to Tustumena is nearly 20 years. Our former "BP Teacher of the Year," Sharon Hopkins, has retired this week. She served our district for more than two decades. So has several of our former and current staff members. There will be significant rollover as this group of friends begin to focus on life outside of education.
