- 1) Which personnel? What type of costs? Classroom teachers and funding NO!
- 2) Do away with the pork barrel! There is so much waste in the schools.
- 3) I already bag my trash and clean my dishes!
- 4) Do NOT cut anymore teachers! Cut one counselor from each school; cut one administrator from each school.
- 5) Only administrative costs!
 - 6) At administrative level. No cutting, then "re-naming" a position. Less meetings for principals (sub \$) and less travel at central office.
 - 7) Cut more support staff? Who will cook and clean?
 - 8) This has been done at classified level and this has put additional pressure on them and certified trying to pick up the pieces. Class size increase has lower certified costs.
 - 9) What personnel costs are we referring to?
 - 10) Central Office art specialist
 - 11) Art specialist?
 - 12) I am concerned that we have an art specialist and let the reading specialist go. Doesn't make sense. However, teacher aides are needed.
 - 13) Eliminate art specialist, consolidate departments within Central Office.
 - 14) Art specialist
 - 15) Art specialist, central office
 - 16) What are personal? (personnel?)
 - 17) I think teachers and staff are stretched very thin administrative personnel could be reduced.
 - 18) Eliminate nurses, assistant principals, counselors, activity directors and central office administration.
 - 19) Only at the top, starting with Central Office.
 - 20) Do not cut any more teacher positions!! Start in the school district offices and clean out the positions that could be consolidated with other jobs.
 - 21) Personnel are already accepting the brunt of budget cuts. Personnel who do not serve students directly (face to face) should be cut first.
 - 22) Necessary evil?
 - 23) Reduce administration costs. Reduce teacher support systems. In this climate teachers may have to go it on their own. Sub-contract out all administration, i.e. payroll, personnel, hiring, or let the school themselves look after administration.
 - 24) No more teacher cuts!
 - 25) Decrease number of face-to-face meetings in Kenai/Soldotna. Replace with web-based teleconferences, etc.
 - 26) Too vague yes, administrative
 - 27) I would hate to see this happen. We already feel the man/woman power crunch in so many areas.
 - 28) It seems inevitable. Is the idea of an early retirement bonus possible?
 - 29) The custodial cuts at Chapman had a huge effect on our school. Where would the cuts happen? What is being looked at? Please keep employees up-to-date on changes that will affect them.
 - 30) I am a teacher with the district and did not support a pay increase until one was given to principals.
 - 31) This category is vaguely described. What does "reduce personnel costs" really mean? Fewer teachers? This category name is not very specific for a public survey.
 - 32) A school is not a building, it is the professionals that deliver the instruction.
 - 33) I know this has been cut, but there may still be some room to cut. Possibly an early retirement program to become effective every year would be one idea.
 - 34) One can't occur without the other occurring (reducing personnel costs/increasing class size).
 - Though we need to remain "on top of our profession" my first suggestion would be to reduce travel expenses, including at the district office level. Training may need to become the responsibility of each employee and meetings need to be audio-conference.
 - 36) Administration/Central Office only.
 - 37) I assume this means reduction in staff, i.e. teachers. Perhaps there are other personnel costs which could be looked at.
 - 38) Central office personnel should be reduced, as well as administration salaries should share cuts just like KPBSD employees have already.
 - 39) Don't create new high paying positions such as Data Analysts who make more than teachers ask for volunteer hourly reduction.
 - 40) Where? How?

- 41) At top administrative level this will happen with consolidation.
- 42) What personnel? Central Office? Data Processing? Technology? NO MORE teachers! Or nurses or custodians!
- 43) Already high expectations from teachers and staff.
- 44) Don't cut the bottom off our totem pole, it will topple. Cutting custodians is not the answer. There are way too many chiefs in your wigwam.

- 1) Already too large!
- 2) No! Kids are not heard in a sea of voices. Teachers burn out and just pass kids along.
- 3) Again, this hurts kids.
- 4) No, the classes at SoHi are already filled to the brim.
- 5) This adversely effects student learning.
- This has been happening gradually for years. How many kids could you handle being around?
 - 7) We have 3 of 4 of our students at Montessori Charter, which has helped our kids. Why can't regular classes in KPBSD be smaller?
 - 8) Can't afford to some are already over capacity.
 - 9) Overcrowding classrooms will cause parents to look for alternative schooling No Child Left Behind smaller class size will help insure successful students.
 - 10) This will cause more students to leave public education.
 - There's too many already; or there wouldn't be such a need for parent volunteers.
 - 12) Increased class sizes are driving more students away from public schools, thereby exacerbating the problem of declining enrollment.
 - Quality decreases physically unhealthy.
 - 14) The class room sizes are already too big!
 - 15) Class sizes are already too big. Some schools room dimensions will not accommodate more students. Individual education goes down as class size goes up.
 - 16) Those "specialists" who do not have classrooms should be there. Put "grant" people into classrooms.
 - 17) If schools are consolidated, perhaps class size will not have to increase team teaching might be explored or year round schools.
 - 18) Only if you lower standards; my biggest class is 36 many kids fall through the cracks.
 - 19) More students are coming to school without basic skills, i.e. lack listening skills, respect for others, respect for rules. They have challenging social skills due to divorce, abuse, drug abuse. The skill of being responsible for their own behavior is lacking and teachers will be spending all their time dealing with behaviors.
 - 20) Only increase class size if you add an aide to help in the class.
 - 21) No
 - 22) I don't like large classes anymore than the next guy, however, when I went to school we had 35+ kids per class and I feel I got a great education.
 - 23) Our son's 6th grade class already has 30 kids in it, to add anymore would not be fair or educationally fair.
 - 24) No only as a last resort. How many board members accepted the offer to shadow a teacher?
 - Currently there are 28 students in my class. Next year predicts numbers to be 30-32. It will be impossible to show student growth and progress with increased class size. Many parents are looking at private schooling next year with class size increase.
 - More efficient.
 - 27) Best practices tends to disappear under this.
 - 28) This would help as well and then offer an additional class or two on schedules.
 - 29) Understand that greater class size would mean less individual attention that could drive more students from our schools to home schooling.
 - 30) NO
 - 31) Class sizes need to be decreased.
 - 32) Class size is so important. Classes of 25+ are difficult to teach because of mandated curriculum.
 - 33) Research shows all kinds of negative consequences.
 - 34) NO!
 - 35) Absolutely not.

- 1) Class sizes are too big as they are consolidating schools would only exacerbate the problem.
- 2) Absolutely it's time to address what's best for kids, not what people who are ego driven want.
- 3) Yes, it makes no sense to have so many high schools so close to each other.
- 4) Yes, if done reasonably; i.e., Nikiski to Kenai, Skyview to SoHi.
 - 5) Outlying, yes. Where it makes sense. If school is full and working well, leave it. Not everyone likes K-3 schools. HELP the Jr. High!
 - 6) Are there any that are not full?
 - Yes! If schools aren't at capacity, then don't waste the resources of operating a building. However, I'm an itinerant speech pathologist and I serve three schools SoHi, Skyview and Nikiski Middle/High. Nikiski needs their school!! With Jr. & Sr. High in one building, capacity isn't an issue. Though our family will be effected as we drive between Soldotna and Kenai. I'd much prefer to see boundary changed for KCHS, and Skyview and SoHi combined.
 - 8) Can be done within reason.
 - 9) What schools? Should have given more information. Move Russian schools to McNeil yes!
 - 10) Overcrowding schools is not the answer parents will look for alternative schooling communities do not want to lose their schools.
 - 11) This has to be looked at carefully.
- Eliminate portables by sending Fireweed Academy and Connections at West Homer Elementary.

- Our school classrooms are already full. THIS is a very wrong and selfish option.
- 14) Smaller schools include smaller class sizes and give more students a chance to participate.
- 15) Chapman School really has a good thing going here. Please leave it status quo.
- 16) School boundaries to balance things. Small is beautiful!
- 17) The schools are busting at the seams as it is!
- 18) Do this instead (of eliminating programs).
- 19) Close Soldotna Middle School and make Skyview and SoHi 7-12 schools like Nikiski, Seward, Ninilchik, Seldovia, etc. Could be done at Kenai as well. Move school district offices into Soldotna Middle School building and save rent in borough building.
- 20) Create complete programs.
- 21) This seems to make a lot of sense both programs and teaching could be offered to more students. Why duplicate services?
- 22) Wherever feasible and reasonable. Change boundaries to balance student count where feasible/reasonable.
- 23) I disagree but what difference does it make what I think?
- 24) In small communities this is a definite No. This will kill a community.
- Yes! This saves funds all the way around, plus unites the community.
- 26) The central peninsula only needs 2 high schools. We cannot afford to run four.
- 27) Good idea cost effective, efficient, makes sense.
- 28) Within a 15 mile radius.
- 29) Some obvious choices exist closing Skyview, consolidating Chapman Jr. High with Homer Middle.
- 30) This seems a viable way to save money.
- 31) At some point this is going to happen. Consolidation with portables does not seem to be much of a savings; extra heat, building them, etc.
- I hope this would be looked at very carefully. How the school is part of the community; location of school; does the school meet the needs of students; what would have the least impact on families-students-communities.
- This is a necessity in the Homer area Russian small schools to McNeil. Paul Banks to West Homer Elementary. Sixth grade of West Homer Elementary to Homer Middle. Please consolidate principals with small schools.
- 34) Some of the smaller schools have become much too expensive to maintain.
- 35) More efficient.
- 36) Combine Kenai and Nikiski, Skyview and Soldotna.
- 37) Consolidate Nikiski and Kenai High.
- 38) Can some of the smaller schools be combined?
- 39) Perhaps, if absolutely necessary and only if it would save programs.
- 40) The Russian schools in Homer area are costly to run. The teachers and staff are having to work around "religious days".
- 41) As enrollment falls may be necessary start with close together schools such as Paul Banks and West Homer Elementary to avoid long commutes and impact to small communities.
- 42) One high school in Soldotna area. Sterling Elementary to Soldotna Elementary or other.
- 43) Buildings and maintenance is expensive. Consolidation would save a lot of money, but would transportation costs then increase?
- There might be a few that could be consolidated, but not very many would be cost effective. I believe large schools are more economical and are the worst idea for academic learning. Small schools serve students best if they have the range of programs.
- 45) Homer High and Homer Flex; West Homer and Paul Banks geography possible.
- 46) Good luck! This should have occurred years ago.
- 47) Consolidate Voz and Raz to McNeil. Bring McNeil into town K-2 at Paul Banks and 3-6 at West Homer, if consolidation is a true need.

- 1) They are what kids come to school for, especially with the large class sizes.
- 2) This will hurt kids, not help them. Consolidate SoHi and Skyview to save programs.
 - 3) No, at SoHi there is nothing left to cut with the exception of AP classes. Few of our students graduate from college. We need vocational education classes. Extra-curricular programs should be taken over by the community.
 - 4) I would rather consolidate than lose options for students.
 - 5) It's time. We've got to put money toward academics. Clubs can pick up the slack. Keep music, P.E., library.
 - 6) Special needs schools are for learning, not an institution for re-hab. Each child has their own personal attendant.
 - 7) Campaign for increased number of volunteers.
 - 8) Do what is needed possibly Boys and Girls Club could pick up some of these sports.
 - 9) Absolutely not.
 - 10) Depends on the programs need more information. This is not a fair question to ask people without giving more information.
 - 11) Some programs could be combined for services and some eliminated.
 - 12) Programs such as P.E. and Music, Foreign Language should not be cut; they are important.
 - 13) What programs?
 - 14) No!
 - 15) Eliminating programs is also driving students away from public schools to home school. I think a stronger emphasis on arts, science and physical education would attract these students back.
 - 16) Programs have been cut enough!
 - 17) What's next? Where are the priorities?
 - 18) Start with the programs that could be done as independent study or combine 1 teacher for several schools. Foreign language would be a start. Also classes offered at the college could be dropped. Classes that have small

numbers of students.

- 19) What would we eliminate? Most have already been cut.
- 20) KPBSD is known for many of its fine programs student needs beyond the regular classroom continue to be important, and the reason many students are present every day.
- 21) Quest could be eliminated. I don't like it, but I could live with it.
- 22) I don't think we should be eliminating P.E., Music, Library or Art. All programs should be looked at to see how many students they service.
- 23) No combine the high schools and maintain programs and curriculum.
- 24) Already at bare bones to keep people here!
- 25) I hate to see us lose programs...especially the arts and music which always seem to be the first to go. The arts are so important for us to be culturally aware and to maintain our humanity.
- I realize something has to go; however, music, art and P.E. are a necessary outlet for our students. They teach not just that subject, but also to believe in themselves and to see things in more than one way. It is another way to help them see outside "the box".
- We keep expecting more from our staff in regards to students but want them to do it with less. How can public education withstand this mind set?
- We must be allowed to focus time, energy and dollars on the core curriculum or it will be a lose lose situation in the next five years, with class sizes of 30-35.
- Academic programs such as <u>Quest</u> shouldn't be reduced these Quest programs are <u>needed</u> for many students in our district. The quality of education our district provides would go down hill if programs such as Quest aren't readily available to the exceptional students who require them.
- 30) Freeze all curricular, building or revision activities. Reduce central office staff to the bare bones. Let onsight staff handle things. Eliminate warehouse.
- Look at sports programs that have less than 12 students participating, cut them. Also look at the more expensive programs.
- 32) What programs? Or how? I don't know.
- 33) Extra-curricular and sports programs may require elimination or higher contributions by parents.

 - Take a good look at your special ed programs. I don't begrudge (name deleted) anything because they have potential to be productive people in the future, but some of the special ed kids have full time paid attendants that just seem to wipe drool off of the kids faces. I think there needs to be some standard as to when the investment of school money is helping a learning disabled or handicap student as opposed to being a baby sitter for a kid who may never leave home.
 - 7) When is this going to end? We specifically moved to Alaska for our kids' education and now are re-thinking our move.

RE: Consolidation Update

Closing schools is an emotional issue for communities. Careful analysis of benefits and costs, those that can be measured (money, program offerings) and those that cannot be measured (community identity, nurturing) must occur. Listed as an option for balancing the budgetary shortfalls of the District, consolidation conversations have been ongoing in the District for the last several years. The importance of this report comes from several sources: in November, the School Board message was clear - do everything necessary to protect pupil teacher ratio (PTR) including accelerating the consolidation plan; information from the Nikiski/North Star combination was that a year long process for consolidation decisions might not be necessary; and the expectation of the Budget Review Committee that consolidation would be a reasonable way to balance the FY05 budget. The administration has spent a considerable amount of time reviewing consolidation options in preparation for this report. The conclusion reached is that no recommendations for school closures will be made at this time. The reasons for this are outlined below and will be discussed in detail at the worksession on February 2, 2004.

For purposes of this report, the background information on the multiple school combinations has been synthesized to the following three key areas:

1) What makes sense instructionally?

Comprehensive schools research shows a size range that is best from an "opportunities for students" perspective to be 300-500 students in an elementary school and 700-900 students in a middle or high school. KPBSD has only three of its forty-three sites that meet these criteria.

2) What makes sense in the business world?

Applying the following standards yielded ten schools in KPBSD that could be closed to become more efficient:

- a) limiting travel by road to twenty miles or sixty minutes one way as the "acceptable" transportation distance
- b) combining buildings to reach capacity
- c) locating buildings where the enrollment trends show students would need to be housed in the future

These ten schools, for the most part, were small schools. Students from these sites would be sent to more urban schools. Boundary changes and transportation rerouting would affect twenty-two schools if this districtwide restructuring occurred.

3) What makes sense in the funding formula?

Knowing that the revenue equation for the state funding formula is complex, each scenario produced by #1 and #2 was examined. In the funding formula regarding size considerations, the first step is district size. The second step is community size. In the early 1980s KPBSD filed a list of eighteen communities on the peninsula; each of those communities is entitled to a school if there are at least eight elementary students. The last step is school size with each progressively larger school size category receiving less money per student from the state. The administration's analysis of closing ten schools districtwide would mean a loss of \$3.5 million in revenue to offset \$3 million savings in expenditures. This realization effectively ended the consolidation conversation as an avenue for budget savings.

The administration has followed its usual thorough process for review of issues in the District. Every program, department, and position is subject to examination as we continue to search for improvement and budgetary savings. Given the rules by which the District must operate, the conclusion reached in this Consolidation Plan may be a surprise to some, but the good news is that, once more, the KPBSD is found to be an incredibly efficient organization.

Ms. Wassilie asked to remove item Number 10a.(1) from the Consent Agenda.

Motion to approve Consent Agenda Numbers 2 through 4 carried unanimously.

Ms. Wassilie acknowledged that the recommended changes to AR 5125 (Student Records) are required as part of the Patriot Act. She asked whether a record would be noted if the US Attorney General issued an ex parte order. Mr. Stewart stated that the student would not be notified that a request has been made to investigate their school records. Mr. Stewart stated that the order would be recorded in the student's records.

Ms. Wassilie stated that according to the proposed revisions in the student records regulation, records of access do not have to be kept for authorized parties or when disclosure is pursuant to an ex parte order in connection with the investigation or prosecution of terrorism crimes by the US Attorney General and asked for an explanation. Mr. Stewart stated that the District would keep a record that would only be available on the record of access to the parent or an eligible student.

Ms. Germano noted that the policy states that a record does not have to be kept for authorized parties which is contradicted by the statement that, "such record of access shall be available only to the parent or eligible student." Mr. Stewart stated that the District's practice is that a record is made when a request is made of student records. He stated that the intent of the regulation language is that disclosure is not made to anyone except the parents or eligible student. He stated that as an example, the US Attorney General might make a request of student records and the District would not be able to disclose the request until released to do so.

Ms. Germano reiterated that the regulation language contradicts itself. Mr. Stewart suggested that the administration review the regulation further.

Ms. Gilman clarified that the only time that the US Attorney General can make a request for student records is when a terrorist crime is being investigated.

Ms. Wassilie stated that she would like a record to be made for all government officials who request to view student records.

Mr. Stewart noted that the revision language came directly from the Association of Alaska School Boards (AASB).

MOTION

Ms. Wassilie moved the Board postpone action on revisions to AR 5125 (Student Records) to the February 2 meeting. Ms. Holle seconded.

Ms. Holle stated that in her opinion the Patriot Act is an illegal act and does not feel that the District should comply. She stated that she will not support compliance with the Act.

Ms. Wassilie asked what the term "parties" refers to in the first complete paragraph, second sentence, on page K of AR 5125. Mr. Stewart explained that occasionally, the court system, a judge, or the district attorney may request student information. He noted that the new language would allow the District to share student information.

Ms. Holle stated that if the District is subpoenaed to supply the court with information, we would have to comply. She stated that adopting the proposed revisions to the student records regulation flies in the face of freedom. She cautioned the Board to be careful and to protect student records as a duty to freedom and privacy rights.

Ms. Wassilie stated that she does not have a problem sharing information with the juvenile justice system but felt that it should be done with parent consent or by a court order.

Dr. Anderson noted that the proposed revisions are to an administrative regulation and not Board policy.

Ms. Wassilie stated that the Board is being asked to approve the regulation and therefore must have some responsibility to ensure that the regulation does comply with policy.

Mrs. Gilman stated that although she may vote for the budget revision, she is uncomfortable with the reduction of unallocated budget by \$600,000. She stated during the last budget revision she voted to keep the unallocated amount because she assumed the money would be used to relieve overcrowded classrooms. She stated that there are still overcrowded classrooms that have not been addressed and, therefore, will be hesitant to add any more money to the unallocated account. She stated that the increase in health care costs of \$559,000 is the District's share and noted that that amount will continue to rise. She stated that the community will need to come up with a solution to the problem. She stated that regretfully, she will vote for the budget revision.

BP 6146.1 (Graduation Requirements)

(8:31:37 PM)

Mr. Stewart recommended the Board approve revisions to policy BP 6146.1, High School Graduation, which simplify the graduation requirements and more closely reflect the state requirements as outlined in the Alaska Administrative Code 04 AAC 06.075. He noted that additional changes have been made since the Board's first reading.

Ms. Megan O'Neill, Kenai Middle School parent, expressed concern for the proposed revisions to the math, physical education, and practical and creative arts requirements for high school graduation.

Mrs. Celia Anderson, KPC assistant professor of art and Ms. Debbie Harris, District art specialist, noted that they represent the Alaska Alliance for Art Education and expressed concern about the possible elimination of the creative arts credit requirement. Mrs. Anderson read a letter from the Alliance for Arts Education supporting art education and asking the Board not to eliminate the arts from schools. In response to a question from Ms. Holle, Ms. Harris responded that a reference was made to Section 14.03.015 of the Alaska State Constitution.

Mrs. Sara Moore, Soldotna High School counselor, asked the Board to require .5 credit each in practical and creative arts and 3 credits in math for high school graduation.

Mrs. Penny Vadla, Ninilchik Elementary/High teacher, asked the Board to require 3 credits in practical and creative arts (with a minimum of .5 practical arts and .5 creative arts credit), and to require 3 credits in math, and to require .5 credit in physical education.

Mrs. Gilman moved the Board approve revisions to policy BP 6146.1, High School Graduation. Mrs. Mullins seconded.

Mrs. Gilman moved the Board approve an amendment to delete all proposed changes to policy BP 6146.1 with the exception of changes to the science credit (Science - 3.0 credits [(the class of 2007 and beyond must include 1.0 credit life science and 1.0 credit physical science.)]. Mr. Anderson seconded.

Ms. Wassilie stated that she agreed with the amendment and added that high school students need consistency. She stated that the current requirements are good and would not like to see them weakened or compromised.

Mrs. Gilman stated that the Board should provide a quality education regardless of the budget situation. She reiterated Mrs. Vadla's statement that students are owed an education of at least equal the value as their parents.

Ms. Holle stated that she hoped the Board would consider another version or another review of BP 6146.1, and take into consideration public comment. She recommended the Board not adopt any portion of the policy revision and instead, put the decision off until a reconfiguration can be made of each credit requirement. She stated that she will vote against the policy revisions because she would like to consider the entire policy all at one time.

Mr. Tilbury asked whether the science portion of BP 6146.1 was the only subject area that needed to be passed soon. Mr. Stewart stated that last year the administration informed school counselors that the curriculum committee recommended the proposed changes to the science portion of the graduation requirements policy. He stated that the science credit change will affect this year's freshmen.

Ms. Germano summarized two previous discussions regarding BP 6146.1. She stated that the discussion held prior to the Board meeting centered on the entire graduation requirements policy and certified diplomas, as well as citizenship and ethics. She stated that the Board will continue to review the graduation requirements in the future.

Mrs. Gilman moved the Board approve a motion to request the mayor and/or Borough Assembly to negotiate a sole source contract with the Village of Tyonek for the express purpose of providing two 'turn-key' teacher housing units for the 2004-2005 school year. Mrs. Mullins seconded.

Mrs. Gilman asked if the Tyonek Village will give the District property for teacher housing for \$1 a year. Mr. Stewart explained that the Village will lease the land for the teacher housing for \$1 year since the District cannot own property in the Village. Mr. Stewart explained that the Village will complete all ground work necessary to accommodate the portable housing units and make them ready to occupy and then the District will take over possession of the units after they are approved by the Borough. He stated that the District will have the units for 30 years for \$1 per year. He noted that the cost of the units are \$300,000 and will be paid for by money set aside by the Borough specifically for teacher housing.

Mr. Anderson clarified with Mr. Stewart that the District cannot own property in the Village because all of the land belongs to the Village Corporation.

Ms. Germano confirmed with Mr. Stewart that the Borough has been involved with the Tyonek teacher housing issue. Mr. Stewart stated that the District will make a formal request after Board approval.

Dr. Peterson recommended the Board adopt Resolution 03-04-2 supporting mandated fiscal impact notes for all legislation or administrative actions that affect school districts and local governments.

Ms. Gilman moved the Board approve Resolution 03-04-2, Fiscal Impact Notes on Legislation. Mrs. Mullins seconded.

Ms. Holle stated that Resolution 03-04-2 is appropriate and makes good sense at any level of government.

Ms. Wassilie asked where the resolution will be sent if passed. Ms. Germano stated that District legislators would receive a copy of the resolution. Dr. Peterson stated that the administration will take copies to Juneau and share them with other school districts during the various fly-in trips. Ms. Holle suggested that the governor be sent a copy.

Motion carried unanimously.

Dr. Peterson recommended the Board adopt Resolution 03-04-3 supporting early funding in the amount of \$4,500. She noted that the issue of early funding is a controversial topic and added that the District's stand is that the state should provide early, adequate funding. She noted that with a base allocation amount of \$4,500 per student the District could continue programs at status quo for next school year.

MOTION

Mrs. Gilman moved the Board approve Resolution 03-04-3, Support Early Funding of K-12 Education. Ms. Holle seconded.

Mrs. Mullins stated that early funding sounds good but that a base allocation of \$4,500 would just meet the needs of the District which is not adequate and added that "better than adequate" is what is needed. She stated that the District needs money to reinstate some of the horrible reductions that have been made over the past several years. She stated that she cannot support an early funding limit of \$4,500.

Mrs. Gilman stated that the resolution is a good marriage of early funding and a request for \$4,500 base allocation. She stated that she was encouraged when District legislators publicly stated during the Soldotna High School Educational Forum that they would support early funding of \$4,500 per student. She stated that early funding is helpful because it allows the District to develop a budget on actual numbers. She stated that if the funding is not adequate, the Board can explain to the legislature why it is not adequate. She stated that the Governor has been clear that he will not authorize a draw from the constitutional budget reserve. She stated that she would rather take the chance on early funding and have concrete evidence to hold legislators responsible than "play the shell game" at the end of the legislative session.

Ms. Wassilie stated that she is afraid that the legislature will agree to early funding but not a base allocation of \$4,500. She stated that parents may present a good case for adequate funding but with early funding it will be too easy for the legislature to dismiss the appeal.

Mr. Anderson stated that Resolution 03-04-3 is well written and that Dr. Peterson captured the Board's thoughts. He stated that if the funding amount is accepted up front, there is no recourse if it is not adequate. He stated that for those reasons he cannot support the resolution.

Ms. Holle stated that she does not want to play politics all of the time. She stated that the most practical way to approach budgeting is to know the dollar amount ahead of time and not six months later. She stated that it is reasonable to ask for \$4,500. She stated that she does not believe that the governor or any legislator could argue otherwise. She stated that the legislature will ultimately decide on the educational funding amount and added that it would be nice to know what it will be ahead of time. She stated that the Board can always present rationale showing why the amount is not adequate. She stated that early funding is reasonable and urged Board members to pass the resolution.

Ms. Germano passed the gavel to Dr. Anderson.

MOTION

Ms. Germano moved the Board amend Resolution 03-04-3 to say "Supporting Early Funding at \$4,500 Base Student Allocation of K-12 Education for FY 2005" as the title, and to add the sentence, "\$4,500 would provide the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District with a status quo budget in the 2004-2005 budget." in the first bullet after the second sentence. Mr. Anderson seconded.

Ms. Germano stated that she is opposed to early funding that is not adequate. She stated that the District should wait until the end of the legislative session in hopes that money for education will be restored. She stated that the Constitutional Budget Reserve is only part of the issue of adequate funding and added that hopefully, legislators will be working on a state fiscal plan. She stated that her concern is that early funding removes the issue from the legislature's consideration because there will be too many other issues to deal with at the end of the session. She stated that although she does not like the idea of early funding, she could support early funding for the 2004-2005 school year in the amount of \$4,500 which would provide a status quo budget. She stated that it should be clear in the title of the resolution that the District is referring to only one year of early funding.

Ms Wassilie told the Board that the District can request early funding of \$4,500 but the legislature will likely lower the amount and yet the District would still receive early funding.

Ms. Holle stated her objection to the change in the resolution title.

Mrs. Gilman stated that she supported the title change because the title will draw the attention of the legislators who read the resolution. She stated that the opportunity of early funding will keep the District from having to make drastic last-minute budget cuts in May that would possibly be restored in June after the legislative session concludes.

Mr. Anderson stated that he did not support the original resolution but with the current amendments, he will support it.

Dr. Anderson stated that during an earlier worksession the Board was notified that the projected budget will be \$6.774 million short for FY 2005 rather that \$5.174 million as earlier thought. He stated that the news is very grim and that the Board does not have a good solution for the problem and asked the public for help.

Ms. Holle thanked Mr. Jeff Tucker at Central Emergency Services and the emergency response people for the donation of the stretcher to the Skyview High School. She stated that the discussions during the earlier worksessions were rewarding. She suggested that the Board slow down and take the time needed to discuss each issue. She stated that she has recently changed her opinion regarding high school graduation and agrees with the District's requirement of 22 credits. She stated that District policies remind members that the Board serves the public. She stated that she intends to communicate to the Governor that she feels it is inappropriate for the State of Alaska to provide additional funding to the University of Alaska system when K-12 public education is not being adequately funded. She stated that the public needs to be persistent and to write numerous letters of support to state legislators. She stated that there is a perception that the District does not hire locally qualified applicants and added that the Board should be promoting local hire.

Mrs. Gilman reported that she attended Christmas programs at Sears Elementary School and Soldotna Elementary School. She stated that she is amazed at the student and teacher talent within the District. She noted that the KPAA career development report submitted by Karen Wessel was the best report she has read. She stated that Ms. Wessel has a tremendous passion for writing which she will obviously impart to her students. She expressed appreciation for the Ninilchik Elementary/High School report and for the quote used in the report, "We train, we teach and we love." She thanked Miss Michele Weaver, Skyview High School student for speaking to the Board about the high school graduation qualifying exam. She suggested that extra credit be awarded to students who are willing to speak during a Board meeting. She noted that the Anchorage Daily News published an article regarding districts throughout the state (including the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District) that are offering home school programs to students who are also enrolled in private school. She noted that the article reported that home school funding is used to pay for student activities such as ballet lessons, dance lessons, ice skating lessons, etc. She stated that she objects to the practice of enrolling students in the District Connections Program who are also private school students and the practice of paying for student lessons.

Mrs. Mullins thanked Mr. Wetherbee and the students from Ninilchik Elementary/High School for the school report. She expressed appreciation for the information packet and additional information provided for the meeting and for the earlier discussions during the worksession. She stated that she does not like to make a decision without listening to all of the discussions. She expressed her condolences for the two absent Board members who are dealing with family health issues. She asked for an excused absence for the next two meetings (February 2, 16).

Mr. Tilbury thanked the Board for their helpful insight that changed his perspective on a couple of issues. He acknowledged comments made by his Ninilchik High School classmates. He thanked the Board for the discussions conducted prior to the Board meeting.

Mr. Anderson stated that he is pleased to see that there is a real push within the community to try to assist the Board with the budget problem. He stated that there are some very hard decisions yet to make and added that the Board needs to get started on them. He stated that the Board must be noisy and persistent on behalf of education. He thanked the Ninilchik Elementary/High School staff and students for the school report. He asked for an excused absence for the February 2 meeting.

BOARD COMMENTS:

(continued)

Ms. Wassilie thanked Mr. Wetherbee and the students for the Ninilchik Elementary/High School report. She stated that she was pleased to hear that the Ninilchik School, as well as other District schools, are involved in the Ocean Bowl through the University of Alaska-Fairbanks and the Institute of Marine Science in Seward. She expressed appreciation for the student comments regarding the high school graduation qualifying exam and noted that two prefiled legislative bills require the exam but not as a condition for graduation. She noted that she has had a number of people speak to her about the District's graduation requirements. She stated that she agrees with Mrs. O'Neill about what constitutes a basic education. She stated that she is not opposed to the concept of early funding and added that she would like the entire state budget to be forward funded.

Ms. Germano stated that she is optimistic that money will come from the legislature to assist the District with budget issues. She reported that the Borough Assembly will consider the issue of funding cocurricular activities outside the cap. She reported that she spent some time at Paul Banks Elementary in Ms. McDaniel's first grade classroom and listened to every child read. She stated that the District has made impressive progress in the area of reading and expressed appreciation for all of the work of the teachers. She asked Board members to be sure to sign up to attend the upcoming public hearings.

At 9:46 p.m., Mrs. Mullins moved the School Board meeting be adjourned. Dr. Anderson seconded.

40 days - Board of Education

40 days - Central Office and leadership team

40 days - Site administrators

40 days - Schools 40 days - Community

40 days - State and Federal obligations

240 days (now I just wish they were "reasonable length" days!)

The routine functions of the School District continue. In an average year, we deal with approximately 150 critical incidents, 300 parental concerns, 200 employee issues, 400 budget issues, and zillions of required forms (103 for every special education student alone!). It's an understatement to say every day is a new adventure.

Second Semester Outlook:

Besides the routine functions (policy review curriculum review, evaluation, etc.), legislative interactions, and administrative tasks usual for second semester, I predict significant investments of time will be needed in the following areas:

- 1. Weather issues snow removal, snow loads, bus routes
- 2. Nikiski/North Star consolidation principal selection, melding of staff, new identity, emotion of closing
- 3. Consolidation Plan communication, emotion, information assimilation
- 4. Budget specifically changes effecting long standing programs and individuals
- 5. Staff requirements to lay off non-tenured teachers and begin involuntarily transfer process with individuals before spring deadlines will consume the Human Resources Department and senior management time
- 6. Unions three Level II grievances and one week-long arbitration are currently scheduled; more possible
- 7. Cocurricular special election
- 8. Legislature assessment and funding issues
- 9. State Board of Education definition and criteria for "highly qualified"
- 10. High School Graduation Qualifying Exam senior students who don't pass

Other:

- Completed 3 credit "Administrator Change" class through University of Alaska-Fairbanks
- Serving as President of Alaska Association of School Administrators (key issues: administrator turn over, accountability, resources) and President of Alaska Council of School Administrators
- Serving as Board of Director and Chair of Care and Comfort Committee for 2006 Arctic Winter Games
- Presentations to Statewide groups, chambers of commerce, parent groups as requested
- Serving on Alaska Sea Life Center Board of Directors
- Serving as Commissioner on Professional Teaching Practices Commission

IV. STUDENT ELIGIBILITY

A. Parent/Student Responsibilities for Participation

1. Physician's clearance

- a. It is recommended that a physician's clearance for sport activities be on file with the coach and the athletic director or principal.
- b. For wrestling, the initial weigh-ins must be recorded by the coach, and the records kept on file in the principal's office prior to the start of the season.
- 2. **Permission form**. A permission form (Appendix A/Co-curricular Participation Consent Form/ Middle School Warning, Assumption of Risk and Hold Harmless Agreements) signed by a parent/legal guardian must be on file with the coach and the athletic director or principal that:
 - a. States student's and parent's/legal guardian's knowledge of the guidelines (Appendix B/Middle School Activities Guidelines).
 - b. Gives parent/legal guardian transportation authorization.
 - c. Indicates parent/legal guardian responsibility for health/accident insurance.
 - d. Gives parent/legal guardian consent for emergency treatment.
- 3. **User fee**. A user fee payment (Appendix C/Co-curricular Participant User Fee Contract) must be received prior to the first contest <u>or</u> a waiver request must be on file with the athletic director or principal.
- 4. Records. All records must be in order and all forms must be on file before the student is eligible to begin practice in any program

B. Student Requirements for Participation in Interscholastic Activities

1. **Enrollment:**

- a. Interscholastic Program: In order to participate in a school-sponsored activity (including practice), a student must meet one of the following criteria:
 - 1) Be properly registered and enrolled in at least four (4) semester classes, or their equivalent, in an Alaska School Activities Association member school within the district.
 - 2) A student attending KPBSD approved correspondence, alternative or charter program during the first semester of the ninth grade; and a student transferring from out-of-district who attends one of the above KPBSD approved programs after the first semester of the ninth grade, must designate an Alaska School Activities Association member school within the district as the School of Eligibility. The School of Eligibility of a student, other than a first semester freshman, who transfers to a KPBSD approved correspondence, alternative or charter programs from another school within the district will be the member school from which the student transferred.*
- b. Establishing eligibility: For transfer purposes, a student establishes eligibility at a school by enrolling in and that school for fifteen (15) school days or by participating in an interscholastic activity.
- c. Extension of Classroom Competitions:
 - 1) Students desiring to participate in classroom extensions (band, drama, etc.) must be enrolled

and passing in that class at that school.

- 2) The student is not required to be enrolled in four district classes.
- d. Intramural Activities: Students enrolled in less than four classes or non-enrolled students may participate in intramurals on a space available basis determined by the building administrator and/or the site-based council.

*A student attending a KPBSD approved correspondence, alternative or charter program who wishes to change his/her School of Eligibility during the school year, will be ineligible for interscholastic competition at the new School of Eligibility for eighteen (18) school weeks. Such a student may change his/her School of Eligibility during the summer months, under Article XII, Section 9 (3), "One-Time Summer-Only Transfer Without Move of Parents."

B. Student Requirements for Participation in Interscholastic Activities

1. Enrollment:

- a. Interscholastic Program: In order to participate in a school-sponsored activity (including practice) a student must meet one of the following criteria:
 - 1) Be properly registered and enrolled in at least four (4) semester classes, or their equivalent, within the school district.
 - 2) A student attending a KPBSD approved correspondence or charter program that has not been granted separate-school status (greater than 150 students at a designated site) must declare a school within the district as their school of eligibility prior to participating in a school-sponsored activity (including practice).
 - 3) Students attending a KPBSD approved correspondence or charter program that has been granted separate-school status may only participate in non-team related activities (i.e. cross country running, track, skiing, and wrestling) at their declared school of eligibility on a space-available basis as determined by the school administrator and/or site council.

RE: New AR 6146.7

The State recently developed and adapted procedures and forms for waivers for the High School Graduation Qualifying Exam (HSGQE) which students are required to pass in order to receive a diploma. This new regulation addresses the procedures for granting waivers to the HSGQE. The administration recommends approval of AR 6146.7.

[Instruction AR 6146.7 WAIVERS TO THE HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION QUALIFYING EXAMINATION

Parents of high school students seeking a diploma may apply for a waiver to the High School Graduation Qualifying Examination (HSGQE) requirement under certain specific conditions. Alaska statutes and regulations specify three conditions under which a waiver may be granted.

- Late arrival into a public school in Alaska,
- Rare and unusual circumstances, and
- Passing a comparable examination in another state.

Applications for waivers may be obtained from the student's high school or KPBSD Central Office. Parents or students may request forms from Central Office be sent to them during their senior year, if they have not yet passed the HSGQE. Requests for Waivers for late arrival or rare and unusual circumstances will not be granted by the School Board until the second semester of a student's senior year (AS 14.03.075).

All HSGQE waiver applications will be reviewed by the superintendent in a timely manner upon their receipt. After the review, an administrative recommendation shall be made to the School Board to grant or deny the request for a waiver. The parents and student shall be notified of the administration's recommendation by certified mail and notified when the Request for Waiver will be presented in front of the School Board.

The School Board shall take action at a public Board meeting to grant or deny the waiver requests received. Written notification of the School Board's action shall be sent to the parents and student, the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development, and the student's high school principal and counselor.

Waiver requests that are denied by the school board may be appealed to the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development in accordance with education regulation 4 AAC 06.780.
