

### District wide Assessment Program

Each year, the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District assesses student achievement using a variety of measures: The Alaska Measure of Progress (AMP) for students in grades 3 – 10. The AMP assessment is delivered online and is comprised of Language Arts and Math and new this year, Science will be added for students in grades 4, 8 & 10 (replaces the Science SBA Paper/Pencil test). The Kenai Peninsula Borough School District will administer the following assessments during the 2015/2016 school year:

#### Alaska Measures of Progress (AMP) ELA & Math

Alaska Measures of Progress (AMP) is the new online Alaska assessment for students in grades 3-10 which will replace the Standards Based Assessments (SBA) given from 2005 - 2014. The SBA's assessed the Alaska state standards for Mathematics, Reading, and Writing that were adopted in 2004, and AMP is aligned to the State of Alaska English language arts and math standards adopted in 2012. Like the SBAs, students will take the AMP assessment annually to help determine their progress throughout grades 3-10.

Not only does the AMP assess the revised, more rigorous standards, but it is also delivered online and has two subtests, English language arts, and math. Although the assessment is not timed, each subtest takes most students between 90-150 minutes. All students have access to universal digital tools (highlighting, underlining, magnification), and students with Individual Education Plans (IEP) may use additional tools based on the individual student's personal needs profile.

In the spring of 2015, students in grades 3-10 across the state of Alaska took the new AMP assessment. 2014-2015 was the first year of the AMP assessment, and score results are delayed due to the State of Alaska's standard setting process to determine the range of scores for each level of achievement. Individual school scores are expected in October after the process of standard setting is complete. According to the state, AMP scores will be more timely in future years of AMP administration. Statewide scores expect to be released in late August 2015.

Because AMP is a new assessment that measures new and more rigorous academic standards, the spring of 2015 assessment will be used to create a new baseline for KPBSD students, and every student in Alaska. Because of the new assessment and increased rigor, scores may reflect a lower number of students meeting the standards, and will provide more information about student performance on the standards. In the past, the focus was on an overall "Proficient" or "Not Proficient". AMP eliminates those terms and has four achievement levels that will provide educators and parents a better understanding of what students can do.

New in 2015-2016 school year, the required Science assessment will be delivered online through AMP to students in grades four, eight, and ten.

The state has indicated that in 2016-2017 the AMP assessment will become computer adaptive. This means the assessment will adjust in difficulty based on the student's performance, unlike fixed form assessments. Adaptive assessments provide greater score precision and provide an assessment experience for students that is "a good fit."

### College & Career Readiness Assessment (CCRA) - WorkKeys

In 2014/2015 WorkKeys became part of the College & Career Readiness Assessment (CCRA) and high school graduation requirement. This assessment is used to determine student's foundational workplace skills. This assessment is also one of the qualifiers for the Alaska Performance Scholarship. Students may retake the assessments as a senior in high school if they wish to better their scores. The three skill areas for assessments are: Applied Mathematics, Locating Information and Reading for Information.

The Work Keys assessment is a criterion-referenced test based on foundational skills needed for workforce readiness and was developed by ACT with input from employers, labor organizations, educators and policymakers.

Students who score at least a Level 3 on all skill areas earn a nationally recognized credential called the ACT National Career Readiness Certificate (NCRC). If the lowest score on any one test is Level 3, the student earns a Bronze NCRC, if the lowest score is a Level 4, a Silver NCRC; Level 5 is a Gold NCRC and Level 6 is a Platinum NCRC.

## College & Career Readiness Assessment (CCRA) ACT [2011 - 2015 Five Year Trend]


**The ACT**° test measures high school students' general educational development and their ability to complete college-level work. The multiple-choice tests cover four skill areas: English, mathematics, reading, and science. The writing test, which is optional, measures skill in planning and writing a short essay.

In order to qualify for the Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS) Collegiate Award, students must achieve a composite score of 21 or higher. The table below shows a five year trend in number of graduates tested & average composite scores.


### College & Career Readiness Assessments (CCRA) **SAT** [2011 - 2015 Five Year Trend]

The SAT is a standardized assessment of the critical reading, mathematical reasoning, and writing skills students have developed over time and that they need to be successful in college. While high school grades are a very useful indicator of how students will perform in college, there is great variation in grading standards and course rigor within and across high schools.

In order to qualify for the Alaska Performance Scholarship – Collegiate Award, students must score a combined total of 1450 or higher. The table below shows a five year trend in number graduates tested & average scores.







### Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS)

The Alaska Performance Scholarship provides an opportunity for Alaska high school students to earn a scholarship to help cover the cost of an Alaska postsecondary education. The first graduating class to be eligible for the APS was in summer of 2011. Course requirements then continued to step up through the 2015 school year at which time they "topped" out.

The charts below shows how the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District graduating seniors have qualified from 2011 – 2015.









#### Performance Series - Language Arts Gains/Target Met


Performance Series is a nationally normed online computer-adaptive diagnostic assessment. The subjects available are Reading, Mathematics, Language Arts, Science, Algebra and Geometry. The assessment provides for more accurate student placement, diagnosis of instructional needs, including instructional adjustments and measurement of student gains across reporting periods (Fall, Winter, Spring). As a district assessment, students in grades 7 – 8 are required to test.



### Performance Series - Reading Gains/Target Met




### Performance Series - Mathematics Gains/Target Met




### AIMSweb - Reading R-CBM


AIMSweb is a form of curriculum-based measurement (CBM), used for universal screening three times a year and progress monitoring when needed in grades K-12. This form of brief assessment measures overall performance of key foundational skills at each grade level to provide accurate prediction of reading and math achievement as well as its sensitivity to growth. KPBSD assesses early literacy and math skills (TEL and TEN), reading fluency (R-CBM) and basic math computation (M-COMP) and math concepts and applications (M-CAP). Assessments are given in Fall, Winter & Spring.
