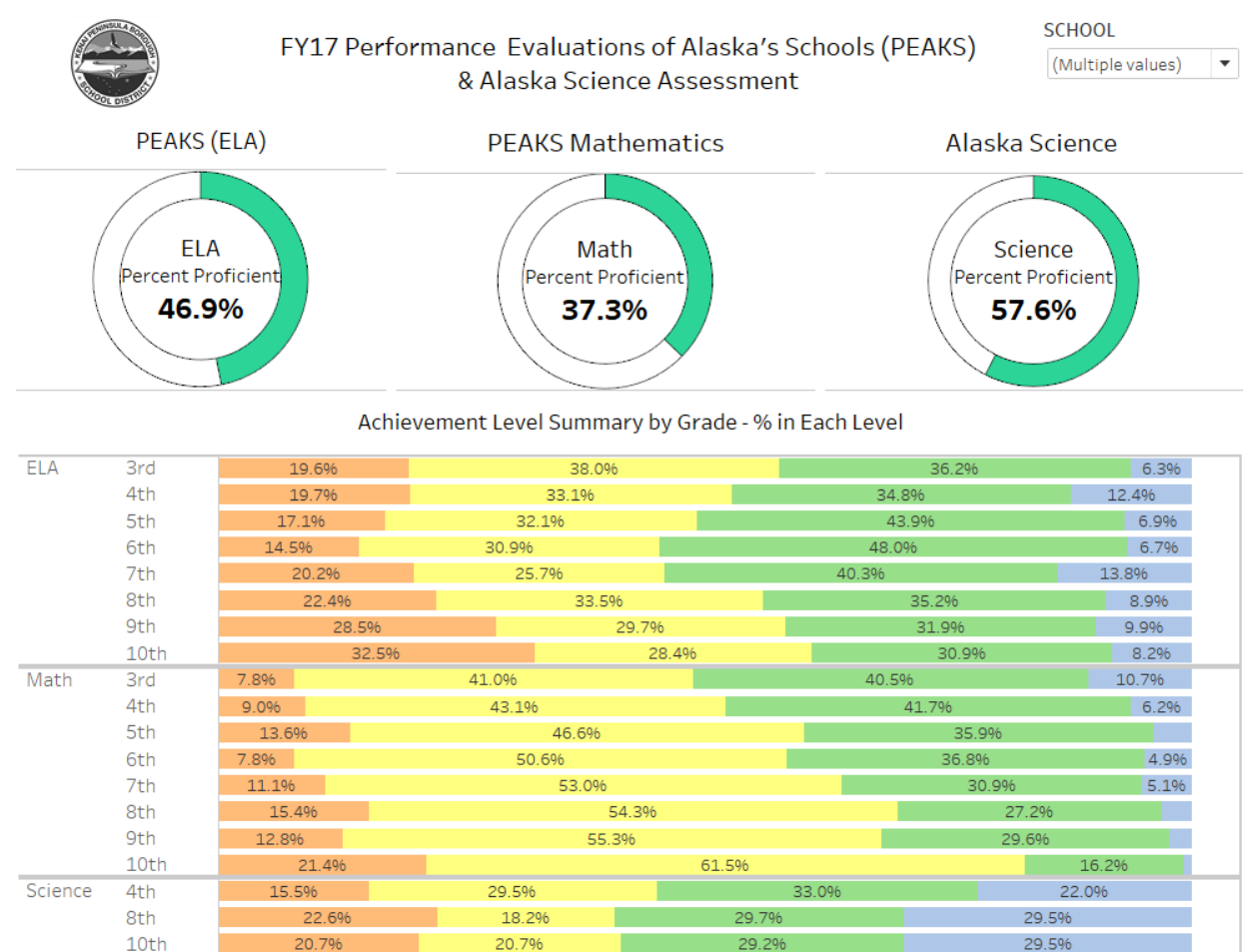

Performance Evaluation of Alaska's Schools (PEAKS) ELA & Math and Alaska Science

The Alaska Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) selected Data Recognition Corporation (DRC) to administer the statewide summative assessments for grades 3-10 in English language arts (ELA), math and grades 4, 8, and 10 in science. The new assessments in ELA and math was administered for the first time in spring 2017. The PEAKS assessments are intended to measure the skills and concepts in the Alaska English Language Arts and Mathematics Standards adopted in 2012 and will be used as a new baseline for future growth in the new accountability system proposed to Federal Department of Education and waiting for approval.

The Alaska Science Assessment was also administered to students in grades four, eight and ten. It provided students the opportunity to show their understanding of Alaska's science standards, which were adopted in 2006.

English Language Learners – ACCESS/WIDA Assessment

English Language Proficiency Assessment

In early 2011, the Alaska Department of Education & Early Development signed a memorandum of understanding with the University of Wisconsin-Madison's Center for Educational Research to obtain a new English language proficiency assessment. The test, *Assessing Comprehension and Communication in English State-to-State for English Language Learners* (ACCESS for ELs) is a product of the World-Class Instructional Design and Assessment Consortium (WIDA).

The English Language Proficiency Assessment (ELPA) is used in determining when English Learners (ELs) have attained full language proficiency in the areas of reading, writing, listening and speaking. All students identified as a Limited English Proficiency (LEP) in grades K-12 are required to take the ELPA. The ELPA is administered in the spring using the ACCESS for ELLs 2.0 Assessment.

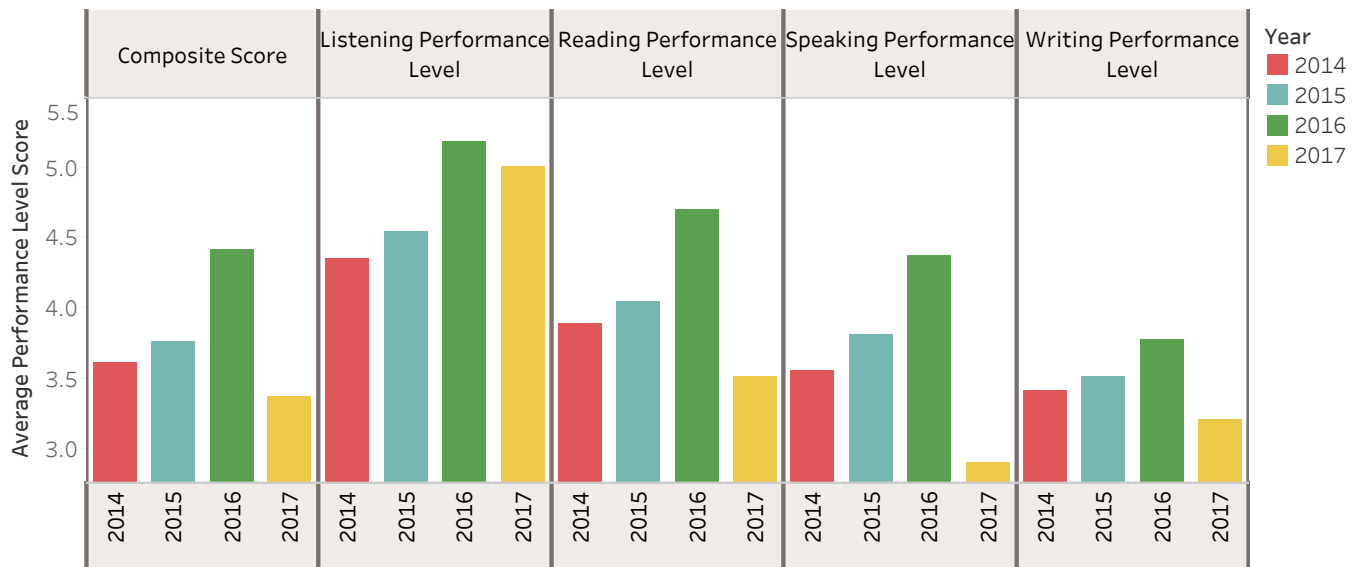
In 2015-2016, the WIDA Consortium began administration of the new summative assessment. The online assessment replaced the earlier paper-based assessment, ACCESS for ELLs.

In 2016-2017, to meet language demands of college and career readiness standards, the WIDA consortium upped the bar through a process of standard setting. As a result, ELs are required to demonstrate higher language skills to achieve the same proficiency levels. Speaking expectations increased the most, followed by Reading and Writing. The entire state saw a dip in overall proficiencies on the ACCESS test administered in February 2017. The following graphics display how students have performed over the past four years.



English Language (EL) Assessment Data & Number Tested

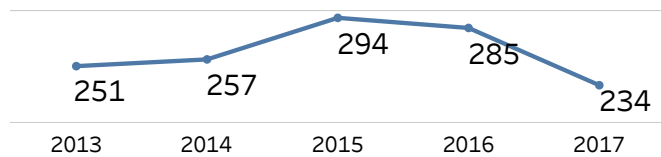
English Language Proficiency Achievement Levels

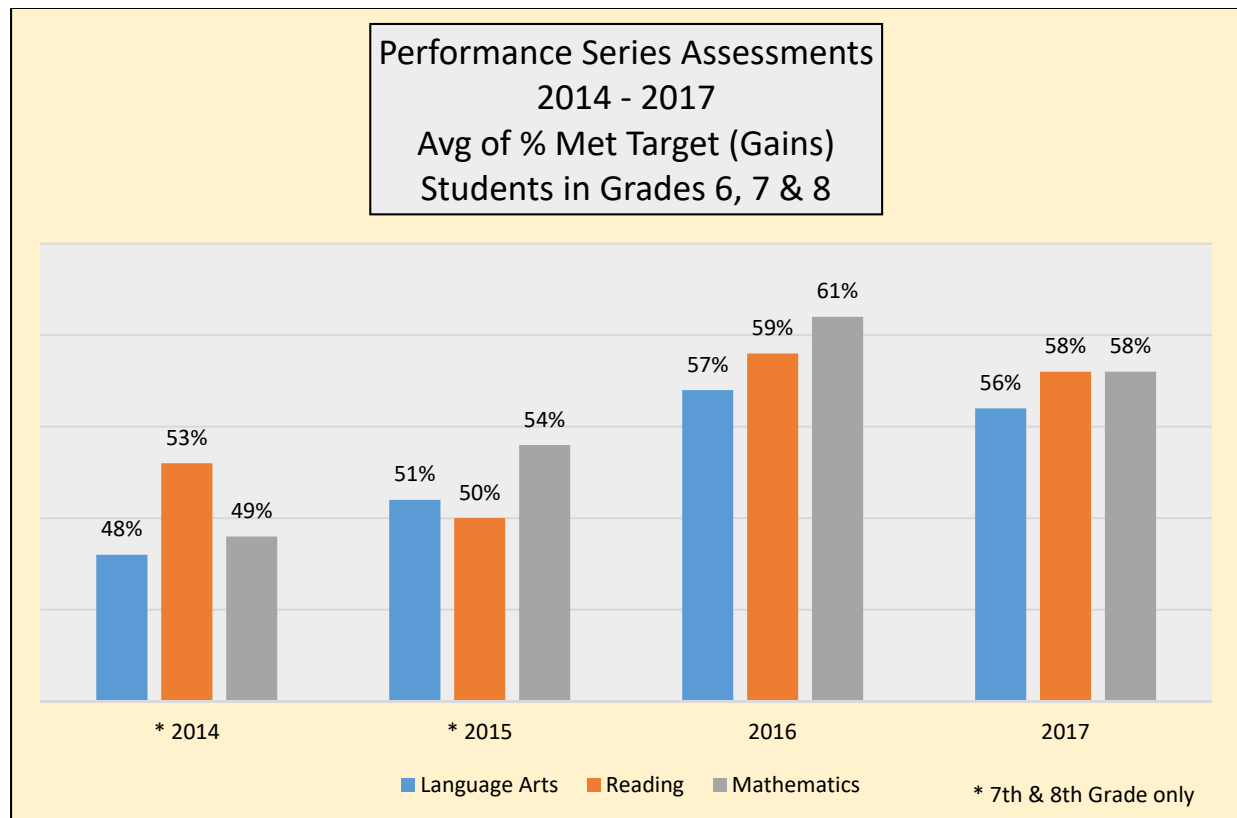

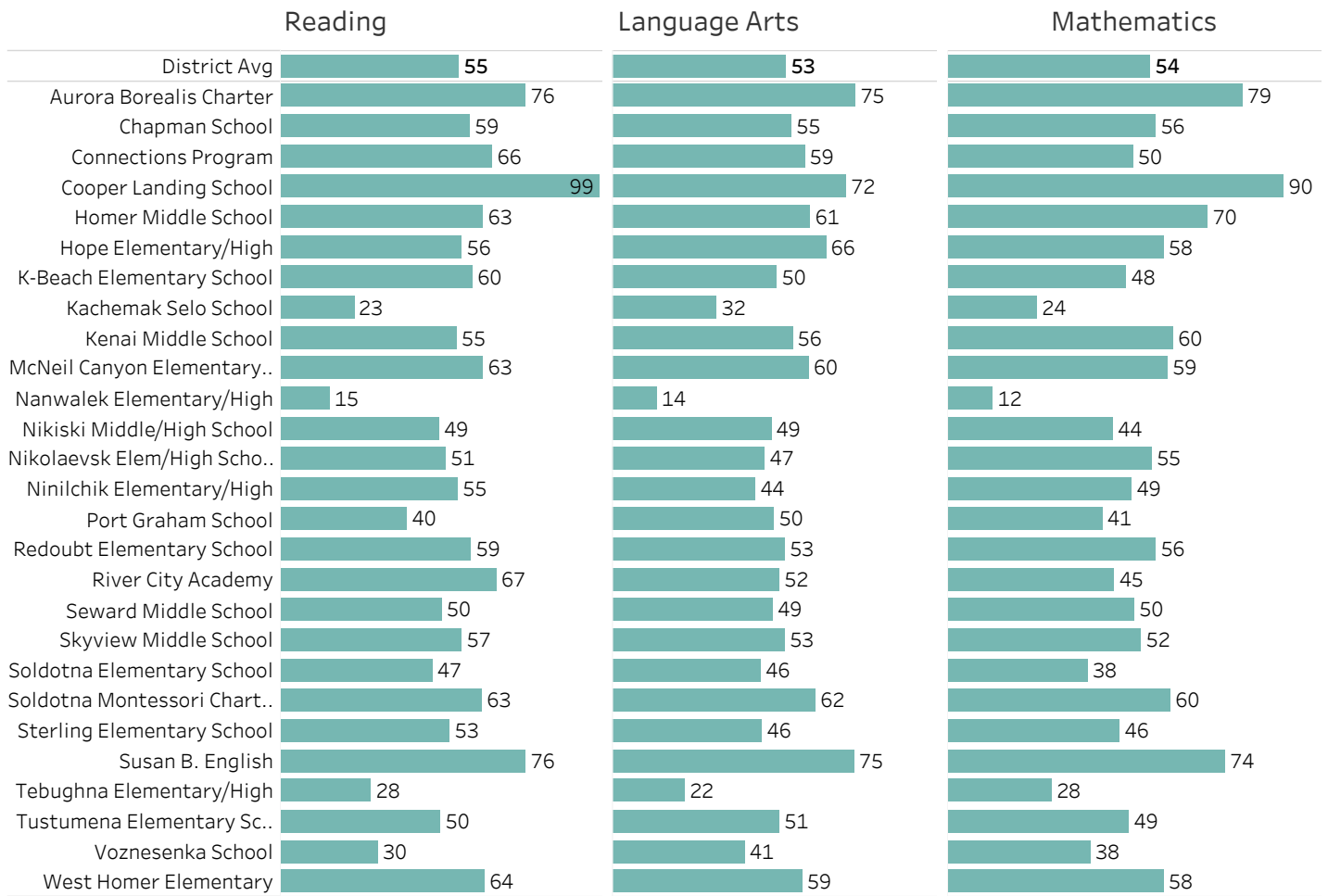
Performance Series –

Performance Series is a nationally normed online computer-adaptive diagnostic assessment. The subjects available are Reading, Mathematics, Language Arts, Science, HS Algebra and HS Geometry. The assessment provides for more accurate student placement, diagnosis of instructional needs and measurement of student gains across reporting periods (Fall, Winter, Spring). As a district assessment, students in grades 6, 7 and 8 are required to test.

 Tested Grades: 6, 7 & 8



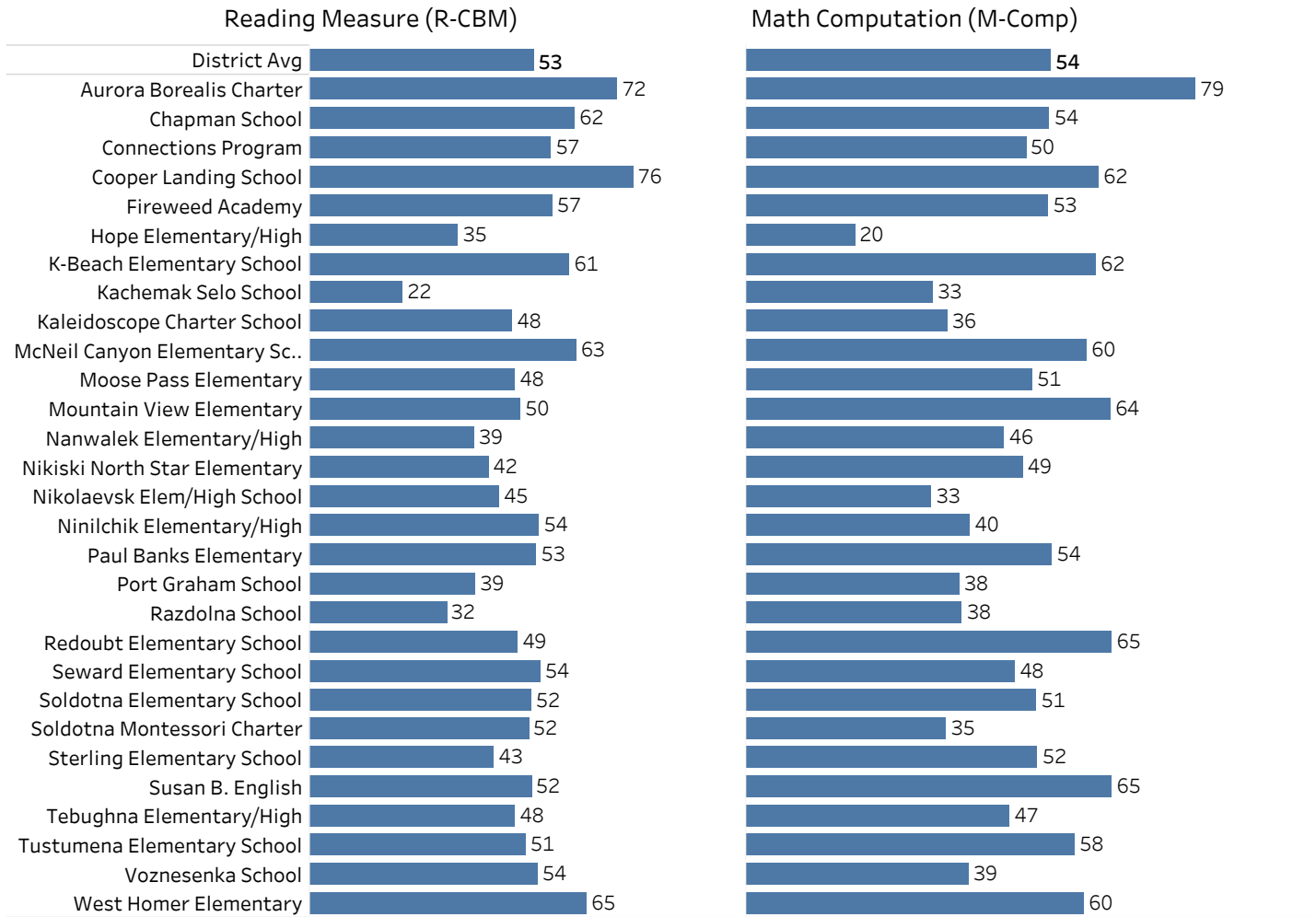

District Assessment: Aimsweb

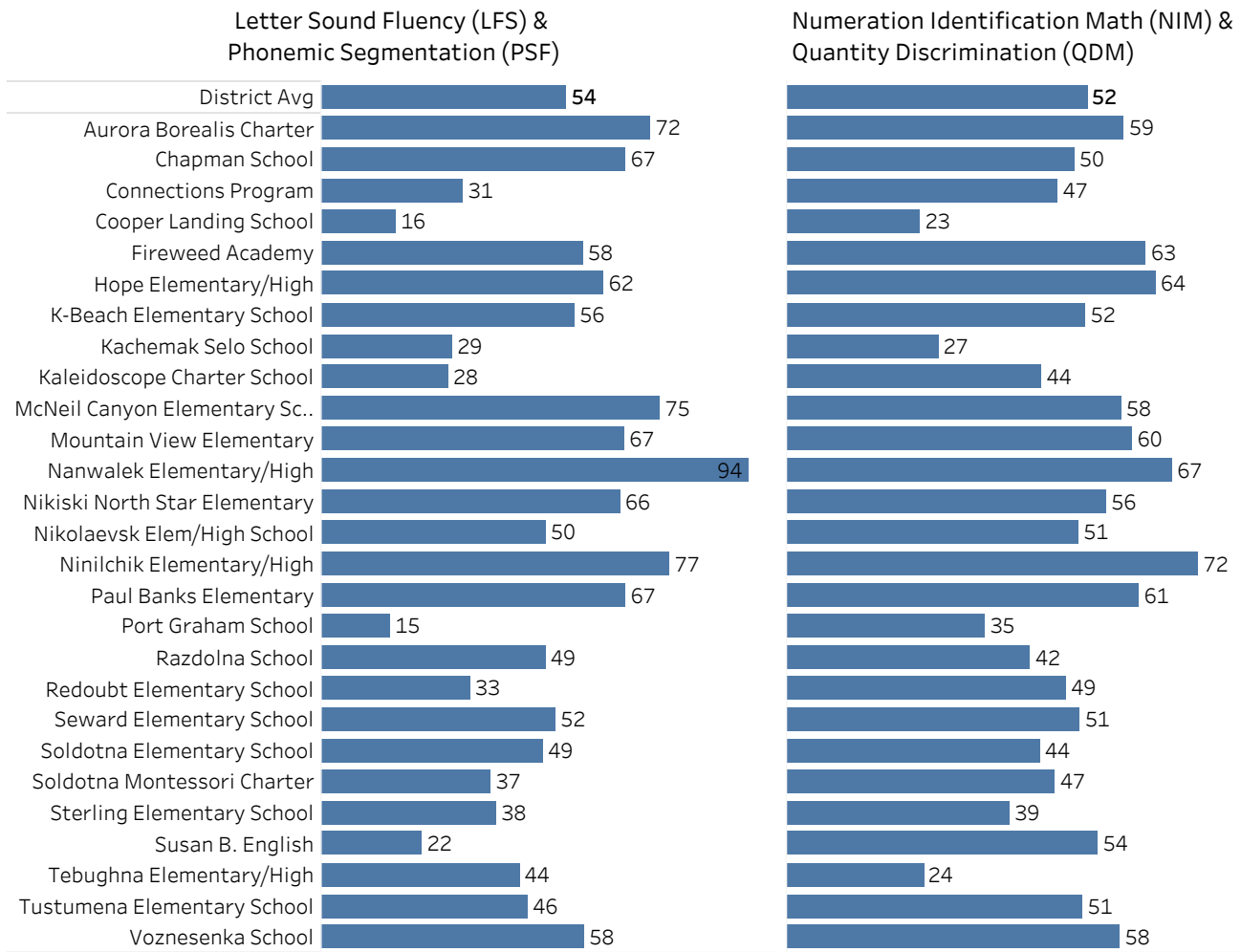
Aimsweb is a form of curriculum-based measurement (CBM), used for universal screening three times a year and progress monitoring when needed in grades K-12. This form of brief assessment measures overall performance of key foundational skills at each grade level to provide accurate prediction of reading and math achievement. KPBSD assesses early literacy and math skills (TEL and TEN), reading fluency (R-CBM) and basic math computation (M-COMP) and math concepts and applications (M-CAP). Assessments are given in Fall, Winter & Spring. As a district assessment, students in Grades K – 5 are required to test.

The following pages contains a bar graph at the District and School level. This data set is the average of the National Percentage Rank (NPR) of the Spring Assessment (May 2017) in the areas of Reading Measure (R-CBM), Math Computation (M-Comp) and at the Kindergarten level: Letter Sound Fluency (LFS) and Numeration Identification Math (NIM).

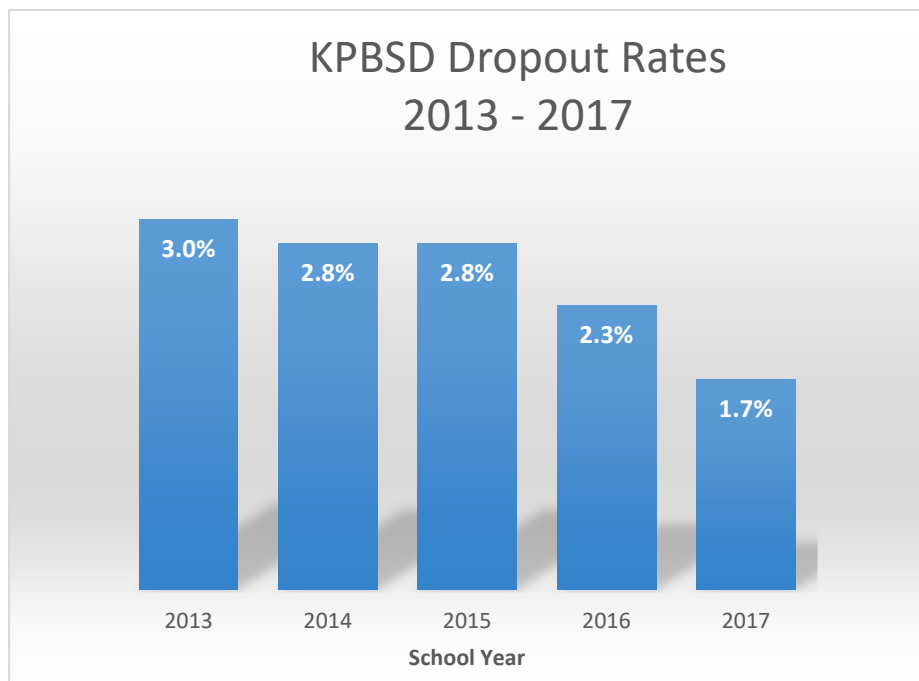

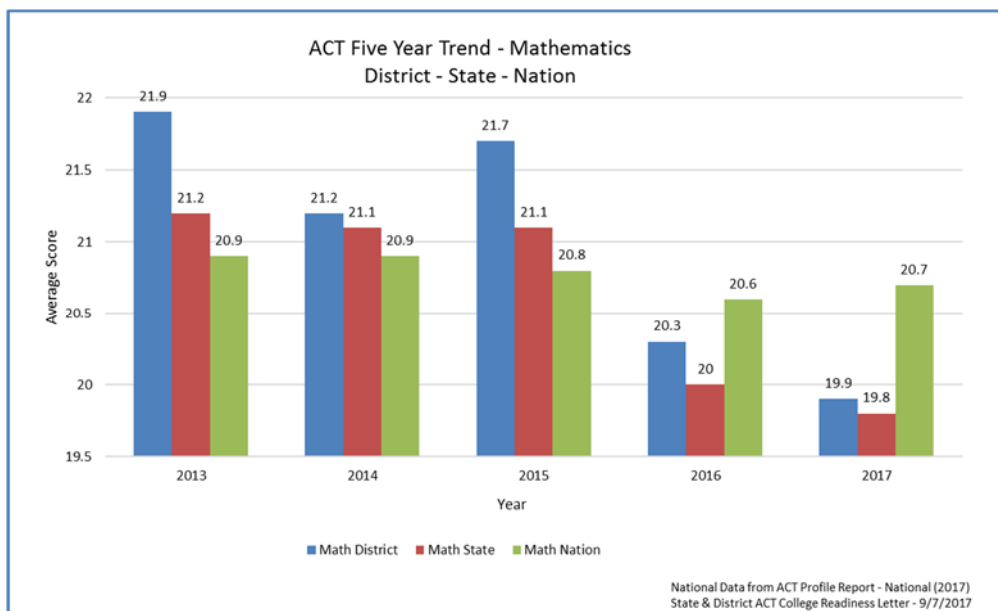

ACT [2013 – 2017 Five Year Trend]

The ACT® test measures high school students' general educational development and predicts their ability to complete college-level work. The multiple-choice tests cover four skill areas: English, mathematics, reading, and science. The writing test, which is optional, measures skill in planning and writing a short essay. KPBSD continues to outperform both the State and Nation in Reading scores. Math scores have declined slightly for both the State and District over the past two years.

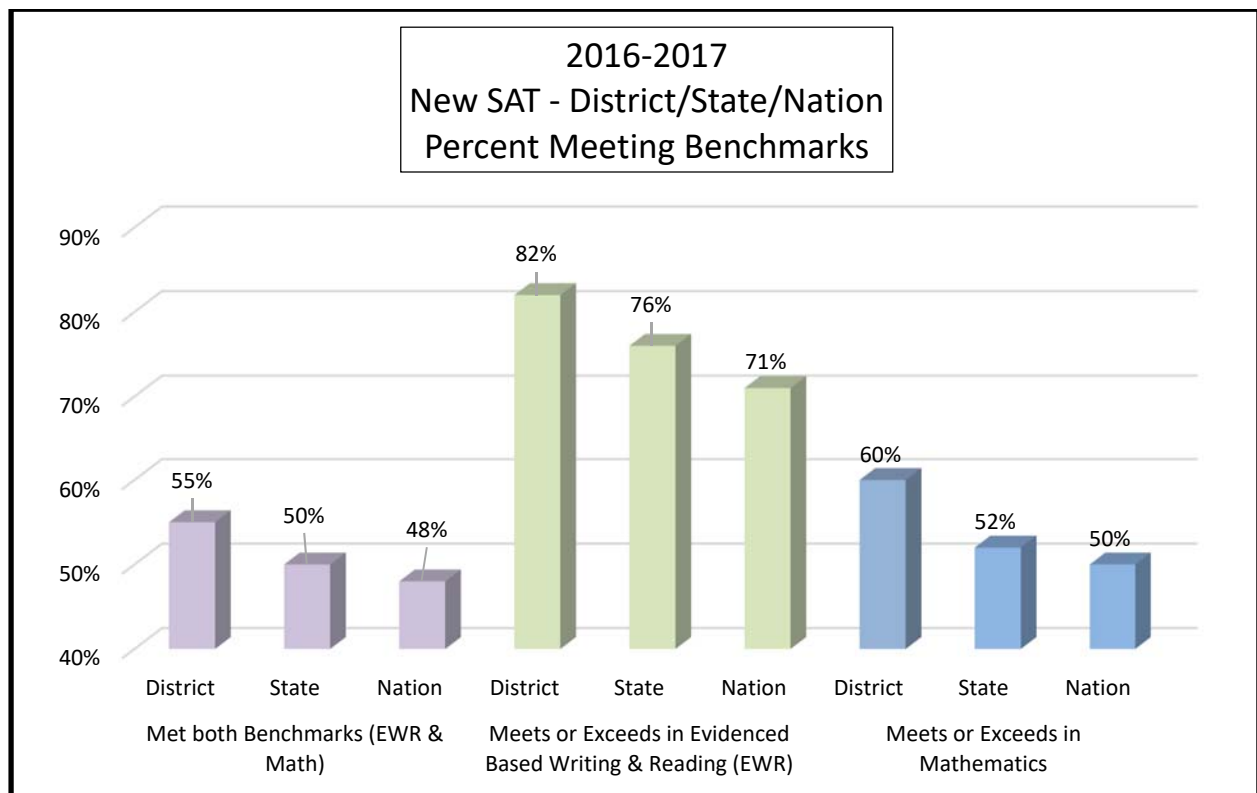

SAT – New SAT benchmark year

In March of 2016, the new SAT test was released. The redesigned SAT provides more robust data and uses a two section score (Evidenced based Reading & Writing [EWR] and Math) and one composite score. As a result, 2017 will be the benchmark year for new SAT and reporting format.

Overall, the district outperformed both the State and Nation in all three areas: Percent who met both benchmarks (EWR & Math), percent who met or exceeded EWR and percent who met or exceeded in Mathematics.

Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS)

The Alaska Performance Scholarship provides an opportunity for Alaska high school students to earn a scholarship to help cover the cost of an Alaska postsecondary education. The first graduating class to be eligible for the APS was in summer of 2011. Course requirements then continued to step up through the 2015 school year at which time they “topped” out.

In June of 2016 State law that had required graduates to take an ACT, SAT or WorkKeys assessment expired. Therefore, students no longer needed to take this assessment and the department of education no longer paid for the assessment. Completing one of these assessments and meeting the target is a requirement of the APS. As a result, there was a drop in the number of students completing the required assessment and a drop in number of graduates eligible for the award.

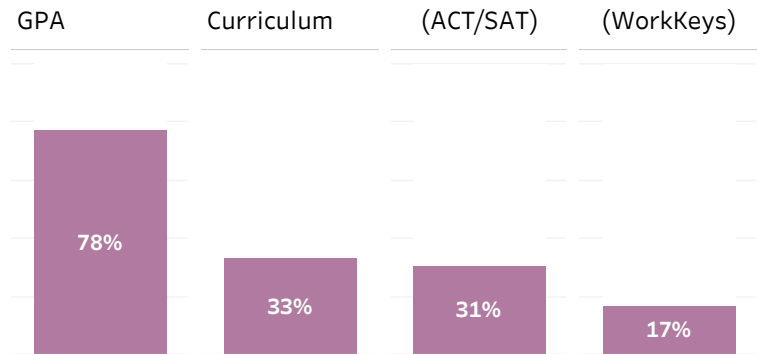

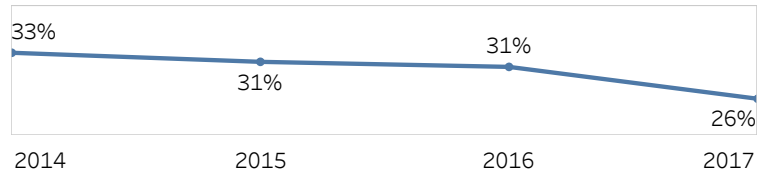
