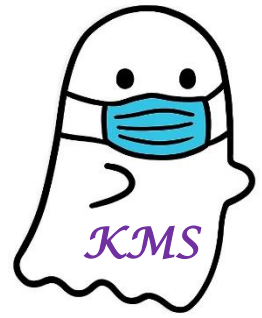


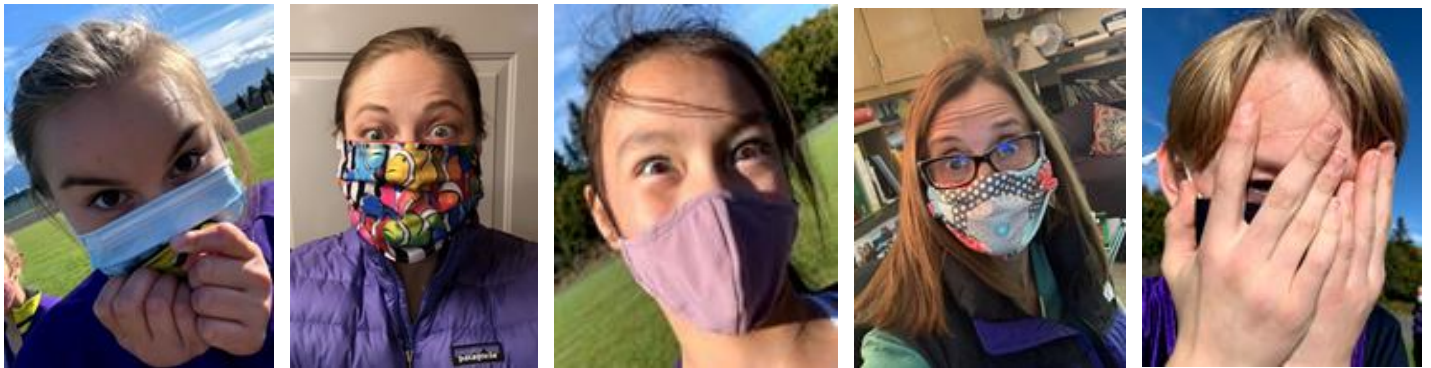

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many/any classes with your friends, and this is your one time to see them. Luckily, you have the rest of lunch to go outside with your friends if you'd like, or go to the gym or library if that's more for you.



She said that overall everything has been going well, but she wants everyone to remember to wash their hands. Since so many people are mostly focused on wearing masks, it tends to be forgotten, so do remember to do that, since you touch so many different surfaces throughout the day. While most are being

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COVID-19

What seemed to be a small flu-like virus discovered in China in 2019 has now become a global pandemic. In this article you will learn where corona comes from, what symptoms look like, the magnitude of it, and how it spreads.

According to the guardian.com, the first case of COVID-19 was discovered in Wuhan, China in the Hubei province. It was found in a 55-year-old man. Some scientists believe that the virus was first contracted in Wuhan's Huanan market (a market where people sell dead animals for consumption). Others believe it was contracted in a wet market (a place where they sell live animals for consumption).

Professor Stephen Turner, head of microbiology at Monash University in Melbourne, Australia, believes the virus most likely originated in bats. Some people believe that humans contracted the virus from pangolins (an anteater-like animal) that is sold illegally; pangolins are popular for their meat and the supposed healing properties of their scales.

COVID-19 mocks symptoms of a common cold such as cough, shortness of breath, lack of oxygen, fever, chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, and loss of taste or smell. Some emergency symptoms are trouble breathing, persistent pain or pressure in the chest, and bluish lips or face.

The coronavirus has reached an alarming level with 3.85 million cases and 215,000 deaths in the United States, 38 million cases and over 1 million deaths worldwide, and 468 cases and 3 deaths on the Kenai Peninsula as of October 13, 2020.

Coronavirus spreads like many other viruses, through person-to-person contact and contaminated surfaces that have crossed paths with the virus. Three ways to prevent the virus spreading is to practice social distancing (staying six feet apart from anyone who is not your immediate family), washing your hands frequently, and wearing a mask.

We may never truly know where the virus came from, but we know that it is very dangerous. All in all, coronavirus is very scary, but if you take all the necessary precautions there is a slim chance you will get the virus.

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made by any mammal's white blood cells, and it plays an important role in the immune system by killing pathogens through oxidation and chlorination.

Mr. Newton: This quarter in Earth Science, 6th graders learned about weathering, erosion, and deposition, the forces of nature that break down land in some locations and build it up in others. The Sedimentary Tub Project teaches students how to connect the water cycle to the rock cycle. Water (in the form of rain and rivers) erodes rock (sediments) and carries them toward the ocean, where it is deposited, creating a river delta (new land). This lesson not only teaches these important land and water processes, but teaches students how to make a syphon and what diatomaceous earth is! 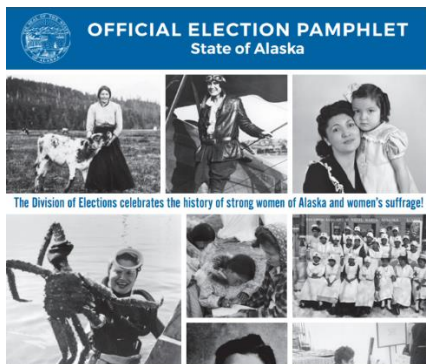
Mrs. Nabholz: As part of the Cricket Wicket Challenge, 6th graders in Quest Explorations have been working on their engineering skills by designing and testing devices that will precisely launch a ping pong ball with enough power to knock down an eraser balanced atop two vertical pencils in a clay base, a challenge similar to hitting the wicket when playing cricket!



Mr. Adair: Fungus Field Trip was a fun exploration right here on school grounds to discover the incredible diversity of our fungi friends. Students were able to collect some of these decomposers, study them, and get an up-close look at the specimens with our dissection microscopes. A tip of the mushroom cap to all those that participated, and to Mr. Adair for being such a fun-guy!



Mr. Adair: On October 22nd, 7th graders had a great opportunity to connect with real-life folks doing science for a career when they had a special Zoom session with MPG ranch in Western Montana. There were so many wonderful questions and discussions, and the ranch biologists shared their research of the mountain lions that live on the property. Students “pounced” on the chance to interact live with the staff at MPG Ranch!



Mr. Felchle: Within our 7th grade mini-election unit, students learned about the history of who could vote within our country and how that has changed over time. We learned about primary and general elections and about how the electoral college is unique to the presidential election. We previewed the 2020 elections, candidates running for office, and the major differences between political parties. Finally, students voted by completing a Google Form that Mr. Felchle created within each Google Classroom. We then reviewed the results and will compare them to the actual election to take place on November 3rd.



Mrs. Stotz-Mason: During this activity, students gained some hands-on lab equipment experience reading triple beam balances and using beakers, graduated cylinders, and more! They enjoyed the chance to practice skills that they will use this year and in high school.



For the friction lab students measured the number of Newtons (amount of force) it takes to drag a block across different surfaces, including sand paper, wax paper, and carpet.

Mrs. Stotz-Mason: The moldy bread experiment was one that I had been wanting to try for a long time. When we went to remote learning for the first two weeks of the year, I decided that was the perfect time to start it, considering that a germ had caused us to be out of school. Deciding on clean hands, dirty hands, cell phone, and singing at the bread with a mask and with no mask, along with a mystery condition, this experiment was intended to show the difference between independent (the above conditions) and dependent variables (how much mold grew on the bread).



With help from Mrs. Navarre and Mr. Felchle, we gathered some samples and set up the experiment to see if washing hands does any good. Turns out, it sure does! Also, a huge source of germs was definitely the cell phone. We were not surprised by that, but we were a bit grossed out!
