

Top Secret Tunnels

Rumor has it that when KMS was built back in 1970, they added a secret tunnel that connects to KCHS underground. KMS was built during the Vietnam War and was originally built as a school with a bomb shelter underneath it. The windows were blacked out, and what is now Mr. Tilly's office was a fallout shelter. The door that leads down to this tunnel is located in a 7th grade teacher's room.

Back in 1970, Kenai Middle School never existed. It was called Kenai Junior High School and held grades 7, 8, and 9. The school blueprints originally had plans to add a swimming pool, but that later changed into what we know today as the basketball court outside.

The blueprints of KJHS, aka KMS, are located in a room upstairs where there is access to the roof and some air ducts. Only staff have access, although they have made a few exceptions.

One exception was in 2020 when a girl named Azilyn Hall played Rafiki in *The Lion King* play. She was on the roof holding a stuffed animal who played Simba. She got on the roof the same way we got to the blueprints. Mr. Lyke, the drama teacher and director, was on the ground filming with a drone.











Another exception was in 2023 when a former Purple Pages reporter named Hayden Williams wrote an article called "KMS Behind the Scenes," and Mr. Tilly let him look behind lots of locked doors to do research for his article.

Even though KCHS was built in 1964, the tunnels were not planned until 1970, when the junior high school came along. The tunnel is connected to the high school through a square hole in the wall that is 3 1/2' tall, 10' long 3 1/2' wide. Kids in the past have gotten into this tunnel through the metal grate in the ground in the back of the high school. While kids weren't injured (that we know of), many got sick from the fumes. This tunnel is only big enough to crawl through and has a gravel/concrete floor.



No kids or people were reported missing, but there are rumors of missing children that got left behind during an evacuation. When Mr. Felchle went down there, he heard feet echoing through the tunnel.

From one of the janitors at KCHS, we heard that there may be more than just one tunnel in the schools. There could be tunnels underneath the whole school, but we don't know why this tunnel is so secret.

Wraging Wrestlers

Conditioning

Conditioning is a challenge all wrestlers need to do to improve their speed, strength, and health. Wrestlers do things like fast feet, five lines, and scenario wrestling. Wrestlers go into five lines in order at the end of the mat room and complete different exercises that Coach Brown tells them. Conditioning is very important but also difficult for wrestlers.

Singlets vs. Doublets

The main purpose of singlets and doublets is so wrestlers don't have clothing in the way. Your opponent can't grab your clothing and the outfit is skin-tight. What wrestlers prefer is entirely up to them. Some people think singlets are easier to put on and take off. These are some wrestlers' preferences and what they think is more comfy. Andrew Fowler said, "Singlets make you look better, and they are comfy." Some people disagree, like Nolan Stillwell, who said, "Doublets not only have the school logo, but they are also easy to take off."

Road Trips

During longer road trips, the wrestlers get to stop at Safeway. Wrestling meets usually take around 5-6 hours, so the coaches stop by Safeway to let the kids get food. Scoring

Refs know how many points to give out for near falls, takedowns, throws, escapes, reversals, and penalties. If you shoot for a double leg and get a takedown, you get 2 points, and if you throw your opponent, you can get 2 or more points, depending what throw you do. Near fall is when you get them on their back but you don't pin them. You earn more points the longer you can keep them on their back. A pin is an instant win, even if you are losing by 10 points. If you can manage to hold people on their back all the way for three seconds, you win the match, but both of their shoulder blades have to be on the ground for it to count.

Takedowns

Wrestlers have many takedowns that are most effective. Kaiser DesOrmeaux said that his favorite takedown is a High C, "It throws them off, and I can get a single leg if the double fails." Brennan Roney said, "I like doing a move I call a single leg jam trip or tomahawk for short. I like to finish the move by getting a deep half nelson and pinning his hands to the mat while putting all my weight on top of them. If that fails, I try to get a bow and arrow cradle."

Weight Classes

The weight classes the wrestlers can wrestle in vary between girls and boys weight classes. But the weight classes for girls are 72 ,81, 89, 97, 105.5, 113, 120, 128, 136, 145, 155, 175, 195, and 275 pounds, and you have to be under the weight class to wrestle in it. The boys' weight classes are 70, 77, 84, 91, 98, 105, 110, 114, 118, 122, 126, 132, 140, 148, 160, 174, 210, and 275 pounds. The girls can also wrestle in a boy's weight classe, but the boys have to stay in their weight classes.

MASTER MATHLETES

Every year, KMS hosts a club called MathCounts. This is a program where advanced math students go to learn new patterns, techniques, and easier ways to go about solving math problems. But it's not just for the highly gifted mathletes; anyone can go and learn new ways to 'do' math!

This year, MathCounts students have been meeting in Mr. Lewis's room after school on Wednesdays. MathCounts is headed by Coach Thomas, who is an HEA engineer and insanely great at math. Each week, Coach Thomas brings snacks, teaches a new math lesson or technique, and puts a lot of math in front of us. He's been a MathCounts coach for many years!

The program starts with a warm-up sheet, usually to write down the first 12 lines of Pascal's Triangle, answer squares and cubes up to 12, or write factorials. After the warm-up, Coach Thomas shows us a challenging lesson about math that most students have never learned about before. For example, he might show us how to find the surface area of an icosahedron. He passes out crunchy snacks like Goldfish or Cheez-Its so we can snack on something while we listen. Later, he splits us into groups, and we play games of Spot It, Dots, Set, or Chess.

Towards the end, Coach Thomas passes out a packet of an AMC test, or sometimes a practice sheet for a Team Round or Lightning Round. The Team and Lightning rounds are both events for MathCounts competitions. They help us to practice math individually, but also to practice working as a team. These skills are important if we are picked for a team to go to a MathCounts competition, or to participate in school math competitions.

MathCounts is a worldwide program that hosts math competitions. Each year, KMS chooses a team of four students to compete against many other school teams from around Alaska and try to advance to the next competition.

Advanced math students, especially the ones who go to MathCounts, also take an advanced math test, the AMC 8. Testers have 40 minutes to work out 25 questions, each question getting harder and harder. The AMC 8 helps students to show what they've learned in math academically.



This year's KMS team members are Leif Laker, Luke Karpik, Eli Pancoast, and Charlie Wang. The team traveled to Anchorage on Thursday, February 8th, and competed in the MathCounts Chapter meet on Saturday, February 10th. We are so proud of our mathletes for doing such a great job at the challenging competition, and we're so proud to announce that our KMS team earned first place in the team round. They will be advancing to the MathCounts State Finals in late March!

Aside from taking the AMC 8 test, and the MathCounts competition in Anchorage, there are local competitions that advanced math students compete in. On February 20th, 18 students from KMS competed in a Quest Middle School Math Meet in Homer against students from about 12 schools in the district. The meet consisted of Sprint rounds, Target rounds, and Team rounds.

Out of all the tests the students completed, the judges had to pick the top 12 students out of 90 students! From KMS, Luke Karpik, Brock Cooper, Eli Pancoast, and Megan Ross made it to the top 12. After the Countdown round, Megan Ross came out in 2nd, and Eli Pancoast came in 3rd! Eli Pancoast also won 2nd place in both the Sprint and Target rounds earlier that day.

There was also a mixed Team round, with each team of 3-4 students representing different schools, grade levels, and math abilities. Three KMS students were on the top winning teams: Kiah Bushnell was on the 1st place team, Megan Ross was on the 2nd place team, and Brock Cooper was on the 3rd place team. Great job, Kossacks, for representing KMS at your math meet!

MathCounts is an important program and keeps



math up-to-date, fun, and challenging! We would like to thank our coach, David Thomas, for helping and volunteering time to continue this program!


