Ingredients:

- 2 cups boiling water
- 2 cups pretzels, crushed
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 8 tablespoon unsalted butter
- 8 oz cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 8 oz whipped topping, thawed
- 1lb strawberries, sliced

Directions:

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- In a medium bowl, combine the Jello package and boiling water. Stir until completely dissolved and allow to cool to room temperature.
- In a medium saucepan, melt the butter and add in 1/4 cup sugar. Mix in crushed pretzels

- · Bake for 10 minutes and allow to cool to room temperature

- · Refrigerate pan for 30 minutes.
- · Mix sliced strawberries into room temperature Jello mixture.
- Pour Jello over cream cheese layer evenly & place in refrigerator for about 2-3 hours, or until set up.
- · Serve and enjoy!


