# Facts and Myths of special education

## Myth:

All students with disabilities are taught in a special education classroom:

#### Fact:

The majority of students (65%) spend most of their day in a general education class

## Myth:

Kids who receive special education will be labeled forever.

#### Fact:

Special education focuses on services and supports based on a child's needs, not on a label.

## Myth:

Kids in special education have to ride the "special bus"

#### Fact:

Some children do have access to legally allowed 'special transportation', but it is optional.

## Myth:

Special education is only for kids with severe physical and intellectual disabilities

Fact:

Most kids in special education do not have severe disabilities but, instead, have a specific learning disability.



# KPBSD Preschool Child Find Program

The Kenai Peninsula Borough School
District (KPBSD) provides
developmental screenings at no cost to
families. This screening helps to identify
children who may have a delay or
disability in order to help them access
services and support as early as
possible. Children who are ages 3 to 5
years old, and who are not enrolled in
school, can be referred.

Concerns might include the following:

- speech/language
- · learning and understanding
- · coordination and movement
- social skills
- self-help skills
- behavior
- vision or hearing



## Who may refer children? Children may be referred by any of

the following:

- Parents/legal quardians
- Physicians
- School personnel
- Child care providers
- · Community agencies
- Infant/toddler programs
- Private therapy agencies

## When could a child be referred for a child find screening?

- When the child seems to have difficulty understanding simple directions
- When you or others outside the family don't understand the child's speech
- When birth complications or a medical disorder interferes with development and/or learning
- When the child appears to be learning more slowly than other children his/her age
- When the child appears to have behavior, social, and/or emotional difficulties that affect his/her ability to learn or interact with others
- When the child seems to have difficulty hearing or seeing

Concerns need not be limited to those listed above. Any condition which may affect a child's ability to learn can be a basis for a referral.

## What is the process if you think your child needs help?

## Step 1

Contact the Child Find office (907.260.5148) to schedule a screening. A developmental screening will be conducted with you and your child within your region.

## Step 2

Results of the screening will be shared. If concerns are noted, a meeting will be scheduled to discuss results and next steps.

## Step 3

If further information and testing is recommended, those will be scheduled with the family. After testing is completed a meeting will be scheduled to go over the results. The team will determine eligibility for services.

## Step 4

If eligible for services/special education, an Individual Education Program (IEP) will be developed. The team will talk about IEP goals and location of where those services will take place.



## Is your child:

## By age 3:

- counts to 3
- mostly understood by adults
- follows simple directions
- matches colors and shapes
- point to 6 body parts
- builds a tower of 8 blocks
- walks up and down stairs

### By age 4:

- counts to 5
- speaks in 4-5 word sentences
- asks "how" and "why"
- answers simple questions
- dresses self
- enjoys other children
- holds crayon with fingers not fist

#### By age 5:

- knows "today" and "yesterday"
- climbs a slide ladder
- cuts on a straight line
- copies shapes
- understands words "on, under, behind"
- uses the bathroom without help
