

The overall mission of the State of Alaska Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) is to enhance the quality of life for low and moderate income residents, particularly in rural Alaska. The CDBG Program fulfills this mission by acting upon its defined goals and objectives such as providing financial resources to communities for public facilities, planning, and special economic development activities which encourage community self-sufficiency, reduce or eliminate conditions which are detrimental to the health and safety of local residents, and reduce the costs of essential community services.

Borough and school district staff have met with residents of Kachemak Selo, Fox River Census District Precinct, who have expressed the need for a public school for their children. Currently, classes are taught in three converted homes, which are leased to the school district. The process for constructing a new school includes community involvement and input from the initial public meeting that describe possible funding sources to the multi-year process to complete the project.

The borough and the school district wish to apply for CDBG funds to complete the required educational specification document, a process that documents community and educators' input for the purpose of guiding project feasibility. Additionally, this process is an essential support document needed for the grant application to the Alaska Department of Education, which may fund design, engineering and construction.

In order to apply for CDBG funds, the grant program requires: a resolution of support from the governing body; Kachemak Selo, Fox River Census District Precinct, residents qualify for low to moderate income level at 62.9 percent; documentation that the project and potential funding have

been presented to the residents in a public forum; and 25 percent cash or in-kind services are provided as a matching contribution to the project.

Upon award, the school district and borough staff assigned to the project will document time and effort to a project number to be calculated for in-kind services. The school district will contribute the cash balance to meet the 25 percent match requirement.

Dear Commissioner Hanley:

I am writing on behalf of the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District (KPBSD) to comment on the proposed changes to regulations **4 AAC 19**, Evaluation of Professional Employees. KPBSD commends the Department for proposing the regulations and recognizes that they will help to improve the education of Alaska's students. Although KPBSD is confident that its new teacher and administrator evaluation systems are in synch with much of the proposed regulations, the district makes comments on three areas of the regulations and encourages the State Board to consider the included recommendations.

- 1. **Cultural Standards**. KPBSD feels that the inclusion of cultural standards as a part of the evaluation process is a positive change. KPBSD supports the proposed changes and encourages the Department to show flexibility in its oversight for how each district will determine whether a teacher or administrator is meeting the intent of these standards. I am confident that our recently developed evaluation systems address these standards.
- 2. **Purpose and Scope of Evaluations**. The requirement that an evaluation helps an educator grow professionally is positive and is an intricate part of KPBSD's evaluation systems. Further, the proposed requirement that an evaluation system have four performance levels (exemplary, proficient, basic and unsatisfactory) on a standard is also in line with our systems. However, KPBSD does not support including the basic designation (as outlined in 4 AAC 19.010 (f)) as a limiting determinant when considering the overall performance rating. Several of KPBSD's schools are small and require a teacher to provide instruction outside of the content area for which they are trained. Receiving a basic rating in such an area, while not desirable, should not be used to diminish an otherwise exemplary overall performance. KPBSD recommends that the limiting designation be changed from basic to unsatisfactory. Finally, KPBSD feels that it is critical that the Department, as part of their evaluation system approval process, establish definitions for the four performance levels.

3. **Reporting of Evaluation Results**. KPBSD supports the inclusion of student learning data in the evaluation systems and strongly recommends that this data not be limited to that which is gathered as part of the state required criterion-referenced tests. In sum, KPBSD feels that a district (with DEED approval) should be given the autonomy to determine which learning data to include for this purpose. Our curriculum development process now includes quarterly common assessments. We feel that these assessments will provide a superior measure of teacher effectiveness than does the SBA data. KPBSD supports that student learning data constitute 20% of the overall evaluation. Finally, building the needed internal assessments for each of the evaluated instructional areas by FY16 will require KPBSD to extend the contracts of those teachers that are a part of the assessment development process. KPBSD strongly recommends that the Department work to secure funds to support districts for this purpose.

Again, thank you for working to improve the evaluations systems for teachers and administrators in Alaska's schools.

Alaska Statute Sec. 14.14.060. Relationship between the borough school district and borough; finances and buildings. (c) Except as otherwise provided by municipal ordinance, the borough school board shall submit the school budget for the following school year to the borough assembly by May 1 for approval of the total amount. Within 30 days after receipt of the budget, the assembly shall determine the total amount of money to be made available from local sources for school purposes and shall furnish the school board with a statement of the sum to be made available. If the assembly does not, within 30 days, furnish the school board with a statement of the sum to be made available, the amount requested in the budget is automatically approved. Except as otherwise provided by municipal ordinance, by June 30, the assembly shall appropriate the amount to be made available from local sources from money available for the purpose.

Honorable Governor Parnell,

With the understanding that the education of our state's children is a priority for all our residents, it is good to know that your Choose Respect Initiative is making a difference. As you know, a child who has a safe and stable home environment will have a much better chance of excelling at school than a child who does not.

For the past several years neuroscientists have researched the effects of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) on a child's brain development. The research shows that toxic stress, e.g., abuse or neglect, in a child's early years reduces brain plasticity and hence, lowers the affected child's ability to learn. Further, the research shows that those children affected by ACEs are more likely to engage in risky behaviors including underage sex and drug use.

Unfortunately, it is probable that several of our schools on the Kenai Peninsula have students affected by ACEs. Because these students often exhibit difficult behaviors, they can become a challenge in the school setting. I am pleased that our schools do a good a job in responding to these behaviors. However, we need to do more to help our staff understand and appropriately respond to those actions that are beyond the student's control. The work that is being done with such students at Lincoln Alternative High School in Walla Walla, WA and, more generally, in the state of Washington, is commendable and deserves Alaska's attention.

If you deem this work appropriate for Alaska, then please consider the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District as a school district to pilot this work. While we could take on such a pilot on our own, I know that state level support would ensure a more thorough and quicker implementation of the strategies for working with children affected by ACEs.

I am happy to correspond on this further with someone from your Department of Health and Social Services. Thank you for all that you are doing for the children of Alaska.

Dear Senator Murkowski:

With all the recent media attention given to the fiscal cliff and sequestration, I feel that it is timely to express concern for the impact that a reduction in funding to the federal Department of Education will have on the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District (KPBSD). Although federal funds only constitute 7% of our total revenue, they are significant because they allow us to offer a critical layer of support to our students, many of whom are from low income homes. Of note, is the district's Title I funds that are primarily used for preschool programs at ten of our Title I schools. These funds are providing an excellent introduction to school for close to 200 KPBSD children.

As you know, there is ample research to support the importance of early childhood education for those students who come from low income homes. I am pleased that our use of Title I funds for preschool is having a measurable effect. While it is too early to determine the long term effect of preschool on our students, the early indicators of the success of our programs are there. In particular, those students who attend one of our preschools are acquiring literacy skills at a faster rate than those who do not.

KPBSD well understands the need to reduce federal spending. I encourage you to consider the impact of a reduction in federal funds to KPBSD and hope that you can work to minimize this impact. Thank you for all that you are doing for Alaska's children. I wish you and your family a peaceful holiday season.

Public Comment for the Alaska State Board of Education and Early Development's Regulatory Proposal Regarding Professional Content and Performance Standards

Dear Mr. Merriner and Commissioner Hanley,

I am encouraged the State Board of Education and Early Development (Board) is proposing and working through a regulatory proposal regarding professional content and performance standards for Alaska's school teachers and administrators. Thank you, as well, for the Board's focus on including student learning as an important factor in teacher and administrator performance evaluations. I write to encourage the Board to set the bar higher in weighting teacher evaluations based on student learning.

Alaskans understand that a teacher has a classroom of children starting from very different places, both personally and academically. For that reason, a single, point-in-time test score does not tell us much about teacher performance in the classroom across a school year. Still, Alaskans expect that teachers (and administrators) be able to take a young person at the start of a school year (and sometimes midway through) and provide an academic experience where demonstrable academic improvement occurs across the school year.

Nearly 20 states in the nation now weight at least 33 percent, and many 50 percent, of the performance evaluation based on student academic progress. I would like Alaska to lead in this, not bring up the rear with 20 percent of an evaluation focused on student improvement.

A number of ways exist to do this, and I understand that each will cost money and time. The Board is best suited to figure out how to get to 50 percent of teacher evaluations focused on student academic growth. The Board should also consider dropping outdated or unnecessary testing of Alaska children, so they are not continually in testing mode rather than learning mode.

I know that student learning is important to members of the Board, and I am asking you to be bold and lead in this with me. Together, let's set the bar high and focus on improving student learning growth in our schools and getting the resources to properly assess progress. When we do, we will not only provide greater opportunity for Alaska's children, but Alaskans will value our teachers and administrators to a greater degree than they already do. Again, thank you for your continued efforts on behalf of Alaska's public school students, teachers, and administrators.

This year I was able to use my career development grant to attend ACSA's annual Leadership Summit. This was my first opportunity to attend this annual conference. It provided a great opportunity to meet colleagues from across our nation who are working at all levels of administration to educate their students and lead their sites.

I selected this conference because of the leadership focus of the presenters with a strong background in leading from a dream or passion base. I also was interested in continuing to cultivate connections with other educators outside of Alaska to give me some fresh perspective and cross pollination of ideas.

The theme for the conference was, "iDream, iEmpower, iLead for a Brighter Future." The keynote speakers were excellent choices for promoting this theme. Rebecca Mieliwocki, 2012 National Teacher of the Year, started the conference by reminding us of how vital great teachers are and the impact and influence they have. She encouraged us to think about how teaching our young people, is a uniquely human endeavor. Particularly, she challenged us to think about using our collective voice and energy to advocate for those skills and talents to be recognized, supported and celebrated. She argued that in our quest to be prepared for the tests, the art of teaching has been marginalized. Jeff Duncan-Andrade followed on Friday with a high energy presentation that challenged us to look closely at our educational environments and align them to be relevant and responsive to our students and their environments. Jeff draws from his 18 years of teaching high school in the Oakland school district to explore the concept of hope as essential for nurturing urban youth. He identified three forms of "false hope" – hokey

hope, mythical hope, and hope deferred. Jeff explained his concept of "critical hope" by describing educational practices that produce and sustain hope and transformation. It was inspiring to hear someone so passionate about educating our children. The last keynote was delivered by Darrell Scott, the father of Rachel Joy Scott who was the first victim of the Columbine school shootings in 1999. Darrell founded Rachel's Challenge to equip and inspire students, educators and parents to replace acts of violence, bullying, and negativity with acts of respect, kindness, and compassion. Since it began, over 17 million people have heard Rachel's story in live settings around the world. Her inspiring story reminded me of how the simplest of kind acts and showing acceptance to all positively affects the climate of my school and community. It renewed the hope in me that I can and do make a difference as I show kindness and compassion to the people I come in contact with throughout my days.

Between these special keynotes I was able to attend several program sessions dealing with improving leadership skills. A common theme among almost all of the sessions was the importance of cultivating relationships and establishing trust in those relationships. I was reminded by these presentations of how important it is for me to have solid relationships with my students, their parents and the teachers at my school. It is also so important for us to extend those kinds of strong relationships with other administrators and educators within our community. One session that I attended was a presentation by a panel of National Distinguished Elementary Principals and their thoughts on making successful schools brought that idea home to me, they needed a friend who could be a sounding board for them, another principal who could give them objective feedback. I also came away from these program sessions thinking that we really need to cultivate relationships within our district as we strive to be World Class, we will only be as good as our weakest member and they need our support to become stronger.

When the conference ended I felt encouraged by the ideas and the discussion that had occurred. It also challenged me again to think beyond my local area of responsibility and to somehow work for change that will affect our district. I would like to think that I will go out of my way to cultivate relationships that I already have and work to establish higher levels of trust with those around me. I am excited to share those ideas, which I think indicates a successful experience. Many thanks to all of the individuals in our district that support on going professional development for educators and make it possible for me to attend these kinds of high quality programs!
