The City of Soldotna has graciously donated \$150,000 to the Kenai Peninsula Borough toward replacing the Soldotna High School track and field with artificial turf. Total project costs are estimated to be \$2,735,858 and funding is being provided by State and local sources.

This ordinance would accept the funds received from the city, reimburse the Borough's General Fund in the amount of \$135,000 that was appropriated through KPB Ordinance 2013-19-37 and appropriate an additional \$15,000 to the project.

Kenai Peninsula College

The Kenai Peninsula College, Kenai Peninsula Borough School District and Alaska Christian College requested funding in the borough's 2014 State Funding Priorities (page 115) to extend a paved walking path from Kalifornsky Beach Road, along East Poppy Lane approximately 4/10th of a mile, ending at the intersection of Poppy Ridge Road. Funds in the amount of \$463.100 have been approved in the State of Alaska FY15 State of Alaska Capital Budget. Senate Bill 119, which authorized the award of the funds to the borough, was passed by the State Legislature and signed by Governor Parnell on May 30, 2014.

The Alaska Department of Commerce, Community and Economic Development has provided the grant award of \$463,100 to the borough and has authorized the borough to enter into a third-party agreement, allowing work to be completed on borough and college property by way of a proposed easement. The borough is currently working with the college and the City of Soldotna to ensure that the maintenance and ongoing responsibilities of the pedestrian path are assumed upon substantial completion.

The grant performance period ends June 30, 2019. Capital Projects shall provide grant oversight and project completion.

Shortened hearing is requested as the state's deadline for signing the grant agreement is November

25, 2014, which is the date of the next assembly meeting after October 28, 2014.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE RELEASE OF A DEED RESTRICTION AT THE REQUEST OF THE HOMER CITY COUNCIL ON A PARCEL OF LAND CONTAINING THE FORMER HOMER INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL THAT WAS DEEDED TO THE CITY OF HOMER BY THE KENAI PENINSULA BOROUGH

1 WHEREAS, Tract 2 Homer School Survey 1999 City Addition. Plat No 2000-22, Homer 2 Recording District contains the former territorial school and the former Homer 3 Intermediate School facility; and 4 WHEREAS, through KPB Ordinance 98-42, Tract 2 was determined to be surplus to borough and 5 school district needs and was deeded to the City of Homer; and 6 WHEREAS, in accordance with Ordinance 98-42, a restriction was placed on the deed by the 7 borough, which states "the site shall be owned in perpetuity by the City of Homer or 8 its successor and managed for the use and benefit of the general public"; and 9 WHEREAS, the City of Homer has managed the property for the use and benefit of the general 10 public; and 11 WHEREAS, the Homer City Council adopted Resolution 13-096 requesting the Borough to 12 "amend...the quit claim deed on the...Old Middle School property to allow the City 13 to sell the property and dedicate and direct the sale proceeds to the use and benefit of 14 the general public"; and

1 2	WHEREAS,	without the restriction, the city would be able to determine how the parcel would best serve public interests under the city's authority and public processes; and
3	WHEREAS,	the city has indicated it would demolish the buildings and utilize the site for a public safety building or sell the parcel and use the proceeds to further public purposes;
5	WHEREAS,	public notice has been published per KPB 17.10.130(F)(2); and
6 7	WHEREAS,	the KPB Planning Commission at its regularly scheduled meeting of November 10, 2014, recommended;
8	NOW, THE	REFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE KENAI
9	PENINSULA	BOROUGH:
10	SECTION 1.	That pursuant to KPB 17.10.130(F)(4), the mayor is hereby authorized to release the
11		deed restriction Tract 2, Homer School Survey 1999 City Addition. Plat No 2000-22,
12		Homer Recording District, set forth in Book 303 Page 614 Homer Recording District,
13		based on the following findings of fact:
14		a. Through Ordinance 98-42 the property was determined to be surplus to borough
15		and school district needs.
16		b. The property was conveyed to the City of Homer pursuant to KPB Ordinance 98-
17		42 on July 7, 2000, subject to the restriction that the site shall be owned in
18		perpetuity by the City of Homer or its successor and be managed for the use and
19		benefit of the general public.
20	:	c. Through Resolution 13-096 the City of Homer has indicated it cannot afford to
21		operate and maintain the buildings and has also indicated it does not have a
22		suitable future use for the buildings.

Peninsula Borough

In 2000 Parcel No. 175-100-70 was deeded to the City of Homer subject to a public use deed restriction pursuant to KPB Ordinance 98-42. This property contains the old territorial school and the former Homer Intermediate School. The property initially consisted of four parcels. Homer area residents separately donated the land to the territorial school, the Parent Teacher Association of Homer and the Territory of Alaska in the 1940's and 1950's, which were then transferred to the borough in 1974. The borough filed a quiet title action on behalf of the city to remove the deed restriction from the parcel that housed the territorial school which required that parcel be used for only school purposes. The parcels were replatted into a 4.3 acre parcel which was conveyed to the City of Homer. The city did not pay for the property; however, the deed was made subject to a restriction requiring the property to be owned by the city and used for public purposes in perpetuity. The intermediate school, has since been used for Kenai Peninsula College Kachemak Bay Campus, Boys and Girls Club, and other generally beneficial public uses. At the time the borough conveyed the property to the city the borough had retained Architects Alaska to perform a site survey which estimated renovation costs of the territorial school to be \$465,780 and demolition costs to be \$190,500. The intermediate school had undergone renovations by the University of Alaska which had a lease agreement with the KPB and the conveyance to the city was subject to that lease. The property was considered surplus to the borough's needs while the city intended to make use of the property's gym and restroom facilities and to provide space for the Boys and Girls Club. The Boys and Girls Club and the University of Alaska no longer occupy the old intermediate school.

The Homer City Council adopted resolution 13-096 which requested the borough amend the deed restriction to permit the city to sell the property and dedicate the proceeds for the use and benefit of the general public. In that resolution the city cites concerns regarding the operation and maintenance costs of the existing buildings on the property and additionally cites goals of providing a new public safety building.

The current assessed value of the 4.3 acre parcel is \$809,400 with the improvements having a 4,000,000 value.

Proposed KPB Ordinance 2014-31 would remove the deed restriction thereby allowing the city to make decisions regarding the future use or sale of the property. Your consideration of this ordinance is appreciated.

- WHEREAS, the borough is the owner of the real property known as the former Homer Intermediate [Middle] School located at the corner of the Sterling Highway and Pioneer Avenue in Homer, Alaska; and
- WHEREAS, the property comprises four parcels that Homer area residents separately donated to the territorial school, the Parent Teacher Association of Homer and to the Territory of Alaska in the 1940's and 1950's, which were then transferred to the borough in 1974; and
- WHEREAS, the real property known as the former Homer Intermediate [Middle] School is surplus to Kenai Peninsula Borough School District and Borough Administration needs; and
- WHEREAS, the University of Alaska, Anchorage (UAA) has renovated the second floor of the former Intermediate [Middle] School building for use by the Kachemak Bay Branch of the Kenai Peninsula College, and the deed to the City of Homer will be subject to a lease between the borough and UAA; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Homer has requested that the borough convey to it for a nominal sum the land and buildings occupied by the former Homer Intermediate [Middle] School, which is presently classified by the City of Homer as public government lands, and is assessed at \$3,203,200 including land at \$703,200 and improvements at \$2,500,000; and
- WHEREAS, a July 1998 site survey conducted by Architects Alaska estimated renovation costs of one of the two buildings on this parcel to be \$465,780 and demolition costs to be \$190,500; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Homer desires to allow public use of the gym and associated rest room facilities of the former Homer Intermediate [Middle] School, and has park and

recreation powers while the borough lacks such powers in the City of Homer; and

WHEREAS, conveyance of the real property known as the former Homer <u>Intermediate</u> [Middle] School to the City of Homer will facilitate continued use of the property for community purposes and relieve the borough of the time and cost to upgrade, maintain and administer the facility; and

WHEREAS, the land is deposited into the land bank; and

WHEREAS, the KPB Planning Commission at its regularly scheduled meeting of August 10, 1998 recommended the assembly enact the ordinance by unanimously consent.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE KENAI PENINSULA BOROUGH:

- SECTION 1. That the Assembly finds that conveying the real property known as the former Homer Intermediate [Middle] School and located on a portion of the E½ Section 19, T6S, R12W, S.M., in the Homer Recording District, Third Judicial District, State of Alaska (Assessor Parcel No. 175-100-05) to the City of Homer at other than fair market value is in the best interest of the public and the Borough. This finding is based on the following facts:
 - a. The real property known as the former Homer <u>Intermediate</u> [Middle] School is surplus to Kenai Peninsula Borough School District and Borough Administration needs.
 - b. While the second floor and the gym of the former Homer Intermediate [Middle] School are in excellent condition, continued ownership of this facility will subject the borough to continuing maintenance expenses, and will eventually require the borough to either demolish all or a portion of the building, or incur significant expenses in refurbishment to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act or other applicable laws.
 - c. The land will be used for a public purpose beneficial to the general public.
 - d. There is a large demand from the public for use of the gym at the former Homer Intermediate [Middle] School, and the City of Homer is the appropriate entity to properly manage the facility for community purposes as the city has park and recreation powers while the borough presently lacks such powers inside the Homer city limits.
- SECTION 2. The mayor is authorized, pursuant to KPB 17.10.100 (I), Negotiated Sale or Lease, to negotiate the sale of the former Homer Intermediate [Middle] School located on a portion of the E½ Section 19, T6S, R12W, S.M., in the Homer Recording District, Third Judicial District, State of Alaska (Assessor Parcel No. 175-100-05) to the City of Homer at other than market value subject to the sale conditions required by this ordinance and the applicable provisions of KPB 17.10 and subject to terms and conditions of the Purchase

Agreement. The sale price shall be \$1.00. The land shall be conveyed by Quitclaim Deed subject to a restriction providing that the site shall be owned in perpetuity by the City of Homer or its successor and be managed for the use and benefit of the general public. The City of Homer is to honor the initial lease agreement between the borough and UAA, Kachemak Bay Campus. The authorization is for negotiation solely with the City of Homer, and it may not assign any rights to negotiate or enter an agreement for sale to any other person or entity.

- SECTION 3. The City of Homer shall plat into one tract as a condition of conveyance the former Homer Intermediate [Middle] School site, also described as Assessor Parcel No. 175-100-05.
- SECTION 4. Pursuant to KPB 17.10.230, that the Assembly authorizes an exception to the requirements of KPB 17.10.090, Disposition of borough land; KPB 17.10.110, Notice of disposition; and KPB 17.10.130(D), Conveyance of land based on the following facts:
 - a. This is an intergovernmental conveyance for a public purpose.
 - (1) The former Homer Intermediate [Middle] School parcel is not classified pursuant to KPB 17.10.080. Authorizing an exception to KPB 17.10.090 allows conveyance of the site without classifying the site. Classifying the site is a redundant step as the land is zoned public/government by the City of Homer.
 - (2) KPB 17.10.110, Notice of Disposition requires publishing notice of the sale four times in the thirty day period immediately preceding the date of the sale. This notice requirement is intended to make the public aware of an opportunity to purchase borough land and will not serve a useful purpose in this situation.
 - (3) KPB 17.10.130 (D) requires that lands or interests in lands be conveyed by an instrument containing restrictions that restrict the use of land to that classification and prohibit the use of the land for any other purpose. The City of Homer's zoning regulations and the deed restriction specified in Section 2 provide adequate requirements on how the former Homer Intermediate [Middle] School site may be used by the City of Homer.
 - b. These exceptions are the most practical manner of complying with the intent of KPB 17.10 without incurring unnecessary expense.
 - c. The granting of these exceptions will not be detrimental to the public welfare and will aid the public health, safety, and welfare.



This first quarter of school we are supporting five day time classes and have five after school academies scheduled. Five of them are in construction, four in welding and two for cad/cam.

The college fair will be October 21st this year.

We advertise our academies via newspaper, emails, school newsletters, face book and flyers throughout the district.

Below are the project activities for this first quarter:

Matt Widaman at the Workforce Development Center has an after school welding academy that started September 23rd and will end December 4th. Matt and his students will be fabricating a snowmobile trailer.

Doug Gordon at Soldotna High School is being supported during the day time class and they are constructing a new snack shack for the high school.

Robert Thompson in Voznesenka is being supported during the day time and they are building two 16 x 20 sheds.

Paul Johnson in Nikiski is being supported during the day for his cad/cam class.

Funds for the Alaska Construction Academies are provided to the Construction Education Foundation by grants from the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development and the Denali Commission.

Bill Carlson at Soldotna High School is being supported during the day in his welding class. Students are learning the basics of welding.

Willie Davidson at Hope School is currently doing an after school academy and the students are learning basic welding skills.

Martie Krohn in Ninilchik will be doing an after school construction academy sometime in late October.

We haven't noticed any problems that affect our projects. We feel the budget provided to us from CEF fits our needs perfectly. We are able to pay for a full-time support staff person to help promote our after school academies, work with instructors on ordering supplies, tracking students attendance along with many other duties. We are also able to offer 12 stipends to instructors to teach the after school academies along with additional funding for supplies to support 20 CTE related classes.

College and Career Ready Assessments replace HSGQE

Soldotna, September 17, 2014—Students no longer need to take and pass the High School Graduation Qualifying Exam (HSGQE) to earn a high school diploma. In May, 2014, the Alaska State Legislature repealed the HSGQE requirement with the enactment of HB 278.

Students must now take a College or Career Ready Assessment in order to attain a high school diploma. The state determined the career ready assessment will be the WorkKeys job skills assessment system, and the college ready assessment portion will be a choice of either the American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT).

Action by October 15, 2014

The State of Alaska will pay for an eleventh grade student to take one of the three assessments. School counselors or principals will work with KPBSD juniors to support their test choice, and assist them through the registration process prior to October 15, 2015.

ACT and WorkKeys assessment during the school day

KPBSD district high schools will continue to administer WorkKeys, as they have for the past several years. KPBSD high schools will now also administer the ACT during the school day. School day administration of the WorkKeys and ACT at school sites will occur on these dates:

- WorkKeys assessments will be administered at schools during a testing window from November 10, 2014, to February 13, 2015
- ACT testing will occur at schools on Tuesday, March 3, 2015, with a make-up date of Tuesday, March 31, 2015

SAT assessment testing

Students can choose to take the SAT at a SAT approved national test center, and it will be paid with a state voucher. The SAT voucher administration will be on Saturday, January 24, 2015. These approved national testing centers will administer SAT and ACT:

Kenai Peninsula College (both SAT and ACT)

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FOR RELEASE SEPTEMBER 17, 2014

- Seward High School (both SAT and ACT)
- Homer High School (both SAT and ACT)
- Ninilchik High School (SAT only)
- Susan B. English School in Seldovia (SAT only)

Students may continue to take both the SAT and ACT, and take them as many times as they choose at a national test center site. However, the State of Alaska will only pay for one test administration of either the WorkKeys, SAT, or ACT.

It was exciting to see their enthusiasm as they began to understand PLC's on a deeper level.

While there was a lot of useful, common-sense ideas that I will be implementing, three areas stood out and were major takeaways from this conference. This first major takeaway is actually one of the more simple concepts. It is called the 4 basic questions and it should be the main purpose of every PLC. Each PLC should determine what students need to know, figure out how to know when they have learned it, decide what to do if they don't know it and what to do if they do know the material. What this does is give clarity to everyone on the team about what they should be teaching and how to know if it is working.

The second major takeaway is how to determine if you have the appropriate interventions to help students be successful. It was good to know that Homer High is doing a good job in many areas of intervention, yet we still have a ways to go. There are eight main characteristics that all interventions need to be successful. They are as follows:

- 1. Interventions must be research based
- 2. Provide increased levels of time and support when a student is not successful
- 3. The response is timely
- 4. The response is increasingly directive (students don't have a choice)
- 5. The process is systematic
- 6. Intervention must be provided by Highly Trained professionals
- 7. Interventions must be targeted to a specific goal or skill
- 8. Targeted interventions offered for both unmotivated learners and for students who are struggling

All of these characteristics are important and shouldn't be overlooked. Unfortunately, we only can say that we meet 4 of these characteristic for each of our current interventions. Our next step is to review and tailor our interventions to make sure they are effective.

The third area that all of our conference attendees thought was helpful was being able to assess what phase of implementation our school was at and plan for our next steps to implement PLC's at HHS. We were able to come up with 2 structural changes that we need to make and 3 action items. The structural changes that need to be made include creating a PLC leadership meeting once per month to help train leaders in how to effectively run their PLC meetings and to help them develop agendas as they start the process. The second was to find 50 minutes per week to meet in PLC's. This is the minimum that the presenters say it takes to run PLC's effectively.

The three action items included reviewing what the PLC practice truly is and is not. Many teachers lack clarity on the PLC process and there may be some misunderstandings. Next we are going to review information on open and closed mindedness and how that can have an effect on school culture. Lastly, we are going to present what Homer High's larger vision of this initiative is. We want teachers to work with the end in mind. All these action items will be presented at our ½ day in-service on October 17th. After this training and feedback from the October 29th early release, we will plan our next steps.

Whether one appreciates the power of the PLC process or not, this workshop was well worth our time and money. There are so many awesome, research-based ideas that will improve one's school, it would be impossible to implement them all. I want to send more teachers to this training.

Behavioral Health and Addictive Disorders Conference in San Francisco

Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to attend the important conference. I will attempt to distill my copious notes into a summary of the sessions that most impacted my experience there.

Keynotes:

- *Addictive Disorders and the Traumatized Brain
- *Addiction Science

*Cannabis Dependence and Adolescent Addiction

This was a full spectrum discussion of cannabis dependence including an historical overview and the neurobiology of cannabis dependence. The biggest takeaway: Cannabis is very destructive to the developing brain, for girls through their 25th birthday, for boys through their 28th, so current research says. The dendrites in the brain are "pruning" until this completion of this development. When the brain is hijacked early, there is a shrinkage of the grey matter which can cause an increase in psychiatric disorders. Thus, there is a proven co-morbidity between cannabis dependence and psychiatric disorders, a new "reefer madness."

In addition, there are solid research-based findings that many learning disabilities are a result of early onset cannabis use.

The physicians giving this talk said, "We must oppose the legalization of marijuana at all costs."

This session was extremely important to our work at Flex, given that I have many students who are chronic marijuana users. I hope to find and expert in or near our community to explain the dangers of marijuana use on the developing brain, because I am certain that our student would hear the information from an expert than from one of the staff here. I think of one student in particular who has gone from an honors student his freshman year to qualifying for special services his junior year for whom this research might apply.

*Change Your Brain, Change Your Life

This was a surprising session. Neuropsychiatrist Daniel Amen opened with this: No other medical specialist treats symptoms without looking at the underlying physiology of the disease/injury that they are treating EXCEPT the psychiatrist who guesses!" Dr. Amen gave extraordinary research based on

imaging of the brain which showed clear pictures of the changes in the brain due to the use of various drugs, the effects of various mental illnesses, and the results of brain traumas. He has been instrumental in the National Football League's discovery of the considerable damage to the brain from concussions.

*Unchain Your Brain

*The Myth of Normal: Depression, anxiety and addiction

The thesis of this lecture is that most of us have had some experience in our childhoods that creates the possibility of mental illness or addiction (whether to drugs, alcohol, food, work, gambling, etc.). Thus, the idea that any of us humans is "normal" or had a "normal" childhood is a "busted myth."

*Taming the Hungry Ghost: Combining science and compassion in dealing with addiction

Focus of this session was the root of addiction: childhood emotional loss or trauma. Ties in with our focus on ACES (Adverse Childhood Experiences) since Regional Inservice, August 2013. These are the students we are working with at Homer Flex High School. So many children who might be diagnosed with an attachment and abandonment trauma, having had an interruption in their relationship with their primary caregivers. The impact of this developmental experience on the brain growth of our children is extreme.

Dr. Mate remarked that it is critical for us to treat our students (or patients) with "unconditional positive regard" (a quote from famed psychologist Carl Rogers), extending from a deep compassion bred in the understanding of the trauma in these children's lives.

*Next steps:

I am already working to find co-presenters in the field of behavioral health and addiction disorders to present this information to our staff, students and parents. I am more than willing to share portions of this information with my administrative colleagues.

Further, Homer Flex, in a group of alternative schools from the Valley, Anchorage, and the Peninsula, has just received a federal grant (see attachment) to fund programs in behavioral health which will help to fund our dissemination of and support in this important area of education.

Grant Addresses Mental Health of Students

JUNEAU -- The Alaska Department of Education & Early Development has been awarded a \$9.1 million grant to improve school safety by addressing mental health issues in school-aged youth through Alaska's Project AWARE.

The five-year federal award, funded through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Service Administration, will provide \$1.8 million annually for districtwide Youth Mental Health First Aid training in Anchorage, Mat-Su, and Kenai, and targeted mental health resources to the following alternative schools in those districts: Burchell High School, Valley Pathways, Mat-Su Central School, Avail School, Crossroads School, Benson Secondary/S.E.A.R.C.H., S.A.V.E. High School, Kenai Alternative High School, and Homer Flex School.

Through local and state partnerships, the grant will build schools' capacity to address mental health in a more coordinated and integrated fashion; provide training for early detection and response to mental health issues; connect youth and families with mental health services; and implement effective ways to promote behavioral health and prevent mental illness.

"Alaska's Project AWARE, by combining enhanced mental health services in alternative schools with training across three of Alaska's largest school districts, will raise mental health awareness and mental health referrals in those communities and provide more mental health services to at-risk youth," said Todd Brocious, education specialist at the Department of Education & Early Development.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

A recent opinion piece on a local radio station's website made the oft heard claim that our country's public school system is failing. The comments were broad, without citation and stated that all improvement attempts have failed. And while there is no doubt that there is room for improvement in all schools both private and public, there should be little confusion as to whether such a generalization includes our public schools on the Kenai. Anyone who has followed the district's progress will note that more of our students graduate on time, academically perform better, have more career training opportunities and are more likely to be steered to an appropriate next step after high school than ever before. Our elementary schools are teaching children to read at a faster rate and have a much better ability to identify and remediate students who are behind. On the operational side, our processes, including how we respond to student safety challenges, are improved. In sum, our schools and school district are better than they were; they are not failing.

The author devotes much of his comments to the idea that vouchers will magically save public education. The basic logic of this argument is that humans, given choice, will make the best possible decision. And while that may hold true for buying a quart of milk, it has not showed to be true for parents of children living in poverty here on the Kenai. Our schools of choice (charter schools) are some of the highest performing elementary schools in the state. Yet, they also have the lowest rates of poverty for our district. Our parents who are poor are not lining up to enroll their children in the local charters. There is thus, little reason to believe that a voucher system would do the same. In sum, I fear that vouchers

would instead concentrate children living in poverty and not as is suggested, level the playing field.

The author's complaint that public schools are too expensive by association suggests that the Kenai's residents are gouged by tax payments for schools. This is also without merit. With the state using oil taxes to pay for more than 2/3rds of our school district's expenses, it is clear that local residents do not have to foot that much of the school bill. As a way to illustrate this, the local amount of property tax that goes to our schools from a tax payment on a residential property that is assessed at \$250,000, is about \$420 per year. Or, about \$1.20 per day. The borough sales tax that goes to schools is so heavily dependent on tourist revenue that residents should smile and not sigh when in July, they see a jampacked Fred Meyer parking lot full of cars owned by people who do not live here.

Finally, it is easy to take shots at public education without looking close to home. Such polarizing rhetoric of failing schools must also include a review of our local education picture. When you do this, you find a picture that is not dim. Rather, it is bright and getting brighter.
