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Cooper Landing School had a delayed start to the school year due to the Swan Lake Fire. The fire came very close to the town of Cooper Landing, but thanks to the efforts of the firefighters and others, the town was spared. School began as scheduled on August 21, but was closed after 4 school days and reopened officially on September 4.

We received two grants this year. The first was the Alaska Community Foundation grant in the amount of \$660. The second one was the Cultural Collaborations Excursion Grant in the amount of \$600. Funds from the Alaska Community Foundation were used on supplies that the school would not normally have had money for, while the Cultural Collaborations Excursion grant funds enabled students studying the Harry Potter book series to attend the Anchorage Symphony Orchestra's presentation of Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone.

All students participated in the Guinness Book of World Records Cup Stacking event last November. The event is billed as the "Most People Sport Stacking at Multiple Locations in One Day." There were 638,503 participants of which we were a part!

8th grader, Cooper Gossard, competed in the National Archery in Schools Program (NASP) competition.

Our Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) held their annual Holiday Market which, as usual, was a huge success. Students, staff and volunteers made over 90 holiday swags which are always well-liked by the community. Earnings from the market help fund field trips such as Alaska Close-Up, where three of our students traveled to Juneau to participate in our state government in a meaningful and hands-on approach.

We had a team of three students who participated in the Alaska FIRST Lego League Robotics competition at Aurora Borealis School last December. The team came in 4th place.

This year, our annual Christmas Play was "A Charlie Brown Christmas". It was directed by students Leihla Harrison and Linnaea Gossard. Every student

participated in the play which was enjoyed by parents and community members. Afterward, a holiday ham supper was served.

We had two teams who competed in Battle of the Books. Our high school team came in second district-wide and our 3/4 team came in third.

8th grader, Leihla Harrison, won first place in the youth category of the Kenai Mountains-Turnagain Arm National Heritage Area's poetry contest, which challenges participants to describe what they love about the NHA in a traditional haiku format. Her winning haiku was titled "Discovery".

To wind up the school year, on May 14th we held our "Author's Tea" via Zoom. This has been a tradition at Cooper Landing School for 20 years running. Also called "Written & Illustrated", each student writes a short story and illustrates each page with a drawing. The books are then printed and bound with a special cover. The books are then shared at an "Author's Tea", normally a community presentation at the school.

Friday, May 15th was Kindergarten Graduation and award ceremony held via - you guessed it - Zoom! Parents and grandparents joined in and Mr. Gossard shared a presentation for the kindergarten students and awarded them their diplomas. Various awards were then presented. Cooper Gossard was awarded this year's Masonic Award for completing his second high school course while still in 8th grade!

Moose Pass School had a productive school year with many achievements to be proud of. The school year started out with students harvesting the potatoes that they had planted in the spring and using their harvest in math and science lessons. The students then planned a potato feed in which each of them took potatoes home and made different dishes, then invited the community to the school to share in the harvest. Many community members attended, the celebration ended with students performing a song for the community about the 50 states in America.

All students participated in putting on a holiday play for the community. Students helped design and build sets, learned songs and lines, and put on a performance that the community was very proud of.

All students were fitted for cross country skis this school year and participated in cross country skiing, with parent volunteers as well as staff members, as part of their physical education.

Social and Emotional Learning

Mountain View Elementary staff recognizes the fact that even with physically and emotionally safe buildings, we still need to help students acquire the social and emotional capacities to function at their peak and take full advantage of the exceptional personalized learning opportunities our teachers make available to them. To that end, we implemented the MindUp social and emotional curriculum for all grade levels.

The first half of the MindUP Curriculum focusses on helping students understand the parts of the brain and deepen their understanding of their own mental processes. As students begin to understand more about the processes of, feeling, thinking and learning, the groundwork is laid for them to monitor and regulate their behavior; calm themselves in the face of anxiety, focus their attention, and take control of their learning.

A simple analogy is that we get the best out of our student athletes by instructing them about body mechanics. Should we not do the same to help our students achieve social emotional well-being and academic success?

The second half of the Mind Up curriculum is dedicated to helping students develop a positive mindset and includes lessons on perspective taking, choosing optimism, appreciating happy experiences, gratitude and kindness.

Approximately 50 parents attended our MindUP parent night to receive information about the program and the importance of school/home cooperation and consistency for students to develop solid social and emotional skills.

Going Out Into the Neighborhood

Mountain View strives to live up to our moniker of Kenai's Neighborhood School. We continue to broaden our relationship with, and service to, the city of Kenai and its residents. Our larger service projects this year included a craft booth at Industry Appreciation Days, a pumpkin painting booth at the annual Kenai Pumpkin Festival, and serving dinner at the Kenai Senior Center on Thanksgiving and Veterans Day.

Bringing the Neighborhood In

Mountain View looks to have our students experience a broad variety of learning opportunities presented by a wide range of caring adults. One of our more ambitious

projects this year was to work with the Prince William Sound Regional Citizens Advisory Council to bring “Masters of Disaster” to our school. In the past, this program was only offered in smaller schools. This was the first time PWSRCAC offered Masters of Disaster to a school the size of Mountain View. During the ½ day program set up in the gym, a dozen PWSRCAC volunteers manned multiple stations where 2nd and 3rd grade students engaged in engineering challenges, learned principles of chemistry, got an introduction to tanker design, and practiced oiled wildlife response.

Other entities coming to Mountain View this year to work with our students included: Kenai Police Department, Kenai Fire Department, Kenai Library, Kenaitze Indian Tribe, US Fish and Wildlife Service, Homer Electric Association, Alaska Department of Fish and Game, Kenai Peninsula College, Junior Achievement, Ellis Automotive, Kenai Brown Bears, Elder Mentor Program, and various local businesses and professionals.

In addition making connections at this young age to career pathways, engineering, and applied sciences is crucial, because students are deciding whether school is meaningful for them and what their future might hold.

Keeping the Kids Out

Of course, 4th quarter was unique. While it is hard to judge exactly just how effective, our online learning actually was there were many successes along the way. Our goal was to keep students and families connected to the school, not just academically but socially, and to keep their trust in us for having the best interest of their students at the core of our actions. Our teachers, students and families gained skills and understandings that will better us as people and improve instruction and learning. It is our job now to move forward with the positive takeaways from this experience to better our school.

Saying Goodbye and Sticking Around

We say goodbye to retiring teacher Dave Daniel, a 32-year member of the Mountain View family. We are however, blessed with a family of staff who bond together and for lack of a better word “stick around.”

All but one of our teachers will be tenured next year. All but one of our certified staff will be on at least their third year at Mountain View next year. Eighty percent of our certified staff have been here over 5 years.

It also provided data if parents expressed concern from their child that they were unhappy with school. The teacher was able to show the parent that the teacher had actually been ranking the survey with positive and then a conversation could ensue about a temporary feeling of sadness or frustration versus a more significant issue.

SPS also works in conjunction with KPBSD Distance Delivery to offer students access to curriculum not offered in our traditional program or as an option to the classroom setting. Students accessed course work in Algebra, Computer Applications, Employability Skills, Health, Geography, Geometry, and Foreign Language. Soldotna Prep implemented a daily schedule and teaching assignments that contributed to the success demonstrated this year. Teachers are organized into core teams with one history, math, science, and language arts teacher per 100 (approx.) students. The four teachers work as a team and have a common prep time where they meet periodically together to develop and plan core teaching methods as well as design interventions for struggling students.

Staff Accomplishments: Soldotna Prep staff participated in many KPBSD Committees and engaged in multiple Professional Development opportunities this year with staff represented on the Math Curriculum committee, and the Recognition committee.

Professional Development was focused around utilizing Canvas to increase the amount of class materials available to students anytime and anywhere and learning/experimenting about/with Personalized Learning (with an emphasis on Student Reflection and Ownership). All teachers practiced and participated in attempts with Data Driven Instruction and Student Ownership and Reflection this year as well as participating Classroom Learning Walks. Soldotna Prep again had very high participation rates in the Caring for the Kenai contest and was awarded over \$2500 for the school to use for future events. Credit Acquisition

Compared to previous 5 years of data for Soldotna Area 9th graders Soldotna Prep School experienced an increase in the percentage of students earning 6 or more high school credits, an increase the percentage of students who are on track for graduation, and an increased reduction in the number of students earning 5 or less credits. 75.3% of Soldotna Prep's students will have earned 6 or more credits and Soldotna Prep will have 84.3% of the 9th grade class be on track to graduate in 4 years. This is in comparison to the previous 5-year average of 69% earning 6 or more credits and 75% of Soldotna Area 9th graders being on track to graduate in 4 years. Additionally, 28.6% of our students will have actually earned more than one year's worth of high school credit at the end of their freshman year and the number of students who are far behind pace to graduate in 5 years has been reduced by 14.5 per cent when compared to the 5-year average. The biggest gains in recent years has been in the students who are far behind this number continues to decrease while the numbers of students who are closer to being on track graduate or who are on track to graduate continue to slowly rise.

Grants Awarded: Working with Cook Inlet Tribal Council, we will be participating in a three-year Fab Lab grant, called Innovation Station. We will have our K-12 grade students engaged in this STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math) program which will be all hands-on and personalized. We are thrilled to begin our training in late July.

Our primary/elementary students participated in Jr. NYO (Native Youth Olympics), sponsored by NVT (Native Village of Tyonek). Our Sr. NYO team were prepared also to compete but due to the COVID virus, their "meet" in Anchorage was cancelled.

One of our 8th graders did compete in Homer NYO before the 'virus stoppage' and received a fourth-place win in "Seal Hop" competition.

Our Girl Scout Troop 77 had "meetings/activities" twice a month to earn badges and practice our school-wide focus of kindness. Every badge we received had to do with helping and serving others.

We worked with NOAA Alaska Fisheries and TTCD (Tyonek Tribal Conservation District) to have our first ever salmon project. It was fascinating to our students, and staff, to watch salmon eggs continue through their process to become full-sized fry. We plan to sponsor this project again this coming school year.

We participated in our Tyonek garden (grow seedlings, plant into garden, weed and harvest). And our hydroponics garden "saved us" when we couldn't go out of Tyonek (due to virus) in order to get fresh veggies for our students. We are expanding the hydroponics this coming school year.

We sponsored three separate "school exchanges", with the help of Rob Sparks,

KPBSD. We met with the UTE tribe in Utah and a school group in Wisconsin in order to share our Native Youth Olympics on SKYPE with them. We also assisted a PhD student from North Carolina, who has been studying our Godwit Shore bird, who comes to Tyonek bogs 7000 miles away to breed

We had teachers come in to teach our students to play and perform guitars and mandolins. We do not have a music class here, so that was greatly received by all.

We had "Portugal The Man." come to perform and motivate our children to live a healthy life.

We had DEA (Drug Enforcement Administration) come for a week to teach our students and community about healthy living). We had large groups of community members attend every day.

Both of these fundraisers are very successful and, along with other fundraisers, contributes to our PTO. In turn, our PTO is able to sponsor transportation for quarterly field trips, assist with classroom projects and field trips, supplement supplies for extra-curricular events, and encourage student involvement through small competitions such as a pumpkin carving contest.

Tustumena collaborates with the Kasilof Boys and Girls Club and Kasilof Community Church to increase community involvement and enrich students’ lives. The Boys and Girls Club have approximately 60 student members who receive a meal, structured
